EDWARDS'S PROTEST IGNORED BY REBELS

Mayor Kelly's Appeal For Ortiz Is Delivered to President.

That the protest made by mayor C. E. Kelly to the government officials in Washington, concerning the holding of an American citizen, Cruz Ortiz, who was sent to the Chihuahua penitentiary in Juarez, has been placed before the state department, is the answer received from senator C. A. Culberson in Washington Wednesday.

Senator Culberson said the message of mayor Kelly had been placed directly before the president and that he in turn had turned it over to P. C. Knox, secretary of state. No answer has been received from Gen. P. Orozco, but the mayor to whom protest also was sent.

Ortiz is an American citizen, born in Las Vegas, N. M., according to affidavits, which the mayor has had taken from people who have known Ortiz during his lifetime.

The charge of being a spy was placed against him by the rebels in Juarez, who caused his arrest. Immediately Consul Thomas Edwards, at Juarez, was notified by his friends and he called on the officials of the town, but they would not release him. He was sent to the penitentiary in the capital yesterday morning.


HOME OF AMERICAN IS LOOTED IN CHIHUAHUA
Chihuahua, Mexico, June 5.—The home of W. H. Kraft has been looted. Kraft is an American, but he is married to one of the daughters of Carlos Zuloaga, a rich Mexican. Alberto Madero married a sister of Mrs. Kraft and their looting, the rebels are said to have taken much of the Zuloaga family silver and many of the rich furnishings of the Kraft home.

A number of residences of rich Mexicans have been looted. The homes had been closed and the families had fled to the states.

REBELS ARE GETTING RECRUITS AT BISBEE

Plot to Overthrow Federal Control of Nacozari Is Discovered.

Douglas, Ariz., June 5.—Forty Mexican rebels, most of whom are said to have been recruited at Bisbee, have crossed the international boundary their way south from Niggerhead hill, east of Douglas.

The secret service officials, here and at Bisbee, were fully informed of the movements of the band and would probably have effected their capture but for the alleged interference of the Mexican consul in this city. Learning in some manner that the band was to start, it is claimed, he made a special trip to Bisbee, and by unguarded inquiries managed to put the men upon their guard. Instead of meeting the band, the secret service officials, they hurriedly named another meeting place and in this way escaped the net which had been tightening about them.

When last heard of the band, partially mounted in the hills north and south of Centia springs, about eight miles southeast of Douglas, they are supposed to be going to Cajon Bonilla.

Gratuitous insults it is claimed were heaped upon the heads of the Americans, and all Mexicans who had not declared their hatred for the "gringos" by Santos Haro, judge of the camp. E. T. Leon, commissary and Enrique Carranza, secretary to the commissary of El Tigre. The affair took place immediately after Leon had learned that he had been replaced by Augustin Carrasco. News of the affair was brought to Douglas by W. L. Kynerson.

Leon and his secretary have made things uniformly unpleasant for all Americans and those Mexicans who believed that Americans had a few rights in Mexico.

It is said that immediately after learning that Carrasco had been appointed to succeed Leon, the trio hired a band and went from house to house where Americans or Mexicans who he believed that Americans should not be molested, resided. At each house a famous bullfight tune "El Toro" was played by the band while the trio of despised officials cursed and abused those in the houses.

U. S. FAILS TO GET INTO TOUCH WITH CHIHUAHUA.
Washington, D. C., June 5.—Difficulties in communicating with Chihuahua city have caused some apprehension to the state department. It is feared an attempt is being made to establish a severe censorship and prevent this government from knowing the condition of Americans still exposed to attack by insurgents.

Attempts will be made to get into closer communication with American consul Letcher, as the United States is determined to extend every possible measure of protection to Americans.

RABAGO MARCHING ONTO CHIHUAHUA

The Yaquis Joining Orozco; Rebels Threaten Hermosillo City.

(By Associated Press.)
Mexico City, Mex., June 5.—Gen. Antonio Ibarra, according to reports which have reached rebel headquarters, is moving north with the intention of attacking Chihuahua. A rebel company has been sent out to meet him. An encounter is expected within four or five days.

Bands of Yaqui Indians are said to be marching on Chihuahua in answer to a call from Orozco. Small bands of rebels were reported near Hermosillo, and there is one small federal garrison there and local volunteers are being drilled to defend the city.

REBEL EMBASSY SAYS HUERTA HAS NOT RETREATED

Gen. Huerta's reported retreat in the direction of Terreon is denied by Mexican consul E. C. Lorente as an embassier. He has denied the reports of the taking of Terreon. "There is no reason for his withdrawal," the consul says. "He is in possession of the field north of Terreon, and there is not sufficient rebel force to draw him back to his former base."

The embassier says he has heard nothing of Pancho Villa's arrest from official sources and knows nothing more than that given by the El Imparcial of Mexico City.

REBEL EMBASSY SAYS HUERTA HAS NOT RETREATED

Rebel commissioners who went to Washington to plead with the American government for recognition of the rebels as belligerents have returned to Juarez. Their mission was a failure and they were in daily dread. It is said, while in Washington, of being arrested for violating the neutrality laws. The commissioners were Manuel R. Lujan and Juan Prieto Quintero (Major Rafael Campa).

It is a bungalow, with 14 rooms, finished very elaborately, having a patio with a fountain and also a sunporch 18x25 feet. The house is being constructed at a cost of \$14,000. There are still two rooms in the house which remain to be completed, but the remainder of the house is ready for occupancy.

Cottage Sold.
The five room bungalow being built by W. R. K. and J. E. Watts in the 800 block on Union avenue, will be completed in the next 10 days. The house is being constructed at a cost of nearly \$4000 and is being made of hard pressed brick.

CITY IS READY TO OPEN OREGON STREET

Mayor Says if Citizens Do Their Part, the City Will Help.

Following the destruction of the corrals and other buildings belonging to George W. Wiley, a negro, which were considered an obstruction on South Oregon street, and particularly so when taken into consideration with the opening of the proposed thoroughfare on South Oregon street to the river, mayor C. E. Kelly stated Wednesday morning that now was the opportune time for the residents along Oregon street to present a signed petition to the city council asking that the street be opened.

"If the citizens do their part, they can count on the city," said the mayor. "There is no talk at present about condemnation proceedings on the part of the city," continued the mayor. "It is up to the citizens, and if they do their part, the city will perform its share, even if it comes to the condemnation proceedings."

OFFICERS OF GERMAN FLEET MEET TAFT

Entertained at White House and Sailors Entertained by American Sailors.

Washington, D. C., June 5.—The admiral of the German visiting squadron with the captains of the cruisers Moltke, Stettin, and Bremen, and other officers, including prince Christian of Hesse-Philippsthal-Barchfeld, arrived in Washington this morning from Hampton Roads to pay their respects to president Taft.

This and other calls on officials of the federal government will take up much of the day. During the forenoon they visited the secretary of state and the secretary of the navy, wearing the brilliant full dress uniform of the German navy.

A luncheon in honor of the visitors was arranged by the German ambassador, count von Bernstorff, and after-ward the German officers with the four American naval aides detailed to attend them called on the president at the white house, where they have been invited to dinner in the evening. This banquet will form the most important function of their sojourn, as during its course the president is to address them on behalf of the United States, and the German admiral will reply.

Sailors of Two Nations Meet.
The higher officers of the visiting German admirals Von Teuber-Paschwitz and the higher officers of the visiting German cruiser squadron were visiting Washington today. The sailors of the three foreign ships who were given shore liberty, were taken in hand by sailors from the American ships and commander Van Bernstorff and after-ward by Col. Strong, commander of the artillery district.

The soldiers acting as hosts, met the German sailors at the wharf with their band and escorted them to the post

The wreck delays all passenger trains due in El Paso Wednesday morning. Two T. & P. trains and a G. H. passenger, due here in the morning, will arrive some time in the afternoon, the wreck having been cleared.

No more trouble has been experienced at the Fabens washout. The track has been repaired, and train traffic is uninterrupted. If no unexpected rise of the river occurs, no more trouble is expected.
