McDONALD SIGNS THIRTY-EIGHT BILLS

Six Become Laws by Limitation; Many Had Been Previously Signed.

Santa Fe, N. M., June 12.—Since the adjournment of the legislative assembly on Saturday afternoon, governor McDonald has signed the following bills, six more having become laws by limitation:

House bill No. 107, relative to irrigation districts.

House bill No. 182, giving a lien on stock for services of stallion.

House bill No. 119, requiring gas and oil wells to be capped.

House bill No. 189, for the protection of community ditches.

Senate bill No. 155, permitting the incorporation of settlements of 150 and more inhabitants and fixing the minimum area at one square mile and the maximum at three square miles.

Senate bill No. 164, amended, providing for a state tax of \$10 on automobiles.

House bill No. 96, providing for public road boards.

Senate bill No. 180, prescribing procedure in case indictments are lost, recalled or dropped.

Senate bill No. 84, providing for the time of election and number of members of city boards of education.

Senate bill No. 82, protecting property rights in dogs, cats and other domestic animals.

Senate bill No. 147, prohibiting the election or appointment of any person convicted of felony to public office unless pardoned and restored to citizenship.

Senate bill No. 186, providing for the location and the following memorials and resolutions have been signed:

REMAINS OF SENATOR NIXON LAID AT REST

Reno, Nev., June 12.—Funeral services over the remains of Hon. George S. Nixon, late senator from Nevada, were held in this city yesterday morning and afternoon. Private services were held in the morning at 10 o'clock. The ritual of the Christian Scientist church was carried out.

From 11 o'clock until 2 o'clock the body lay in state at the Nixon mansion and was viewed by thousands of persons from all over the west. At 2 o'clock public services were held. The remains were placed in a tomb to await the building of the mausoleum.

DENVER BANK HELD UP IN DAYLIGHT

Bandit Captured in Running Battle in Which Many Shots Are Fired.

Denver, Colo., June 12.—A man giving his name as J. Caldwell, and his age as 30 years, walked into the State Mercantile Bank in the Ernest S. Cramer building a few minutes before the bank's closing hours yesterday, elbowed his way to the paying teller's window, presented a pistol and in subdued tones ordered Carl B. Funk, paying teller, to hand over all of the money in the racks.

Seeing the muzzle of the pistol, which the bandit held close to his own body, pointing directly at him, the teller promptly passed out about \$115 in gold. As the time the bank was crowded with people.

The robber took the money, turned and hurried toward the street. The teller called for some one to stop the man, but he reached the door and ran along Seventeenth street.

Caldwell was captured after a short chase by pedestrians and police in which several shots were fired. The money was recovered.

The man said he had been in Denver 10 days ago from Spokane, Wash., where he was employed by the street railway company. His wife was taken in custody at a downtown rooming house, where the couple had been living, and is being held as a witness.

AMATEUR AVIATOR STARTS FROM ROOF

Descends Successfully from Top of Ten Story Hotel in Portland.

Portland, Ore., June 12.—Silas Christofferson, an amateur aviator, of Vancouver, Wash., yesterday afternoon successfully ascended in a biplane from the roof of a ten-story hotel in this city. Christofferson headed directly for Vancouver, eight miles distant, where he landed 12 minutes later.

The feat is said to have been the first attempt of an aviator to make a start from a building.

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DELINQUENT TAX SALE HELD BY CITY

Eleven pieces of property were sold Tuesday afternoon by city tax assessor and collector Louis E. Bahr for delinquent taxes owed the city. The city was the purchaser of seven, and the remaining four pieces were sold to outsiders.

The amount of taxes owed on the property purchased by the city amounted to \$279.11, while the sum of \$493.55 was the amount of taxes due on the other. Under the law, the owner has two years within which to redeem property so sold, by paying double the amount paid by the buyer.

SWIMMING POOL IN PARK SPRINGS LEAK
