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GOVERNMENT HAS MANY DIFFICULTIES YET TO MEET IN SINALOA COUNTRY

Reported That Rebels Are Closing in on Mazatlan With Good Prospects of Taking That Port Again Soon. Would Thus Be in Position to Secure Ammunition Without Stint—Viscissitudes of the Revolution.

Tucson, Ariz., June 21.—Latest arrivals from Sinaloa say that while the north end of the state has seen very little revolutionary activity for some weeks, and the government had the advantage in the recent skirmishes, the situation around Mazatlan is still difficult for the government. The government leaders were not very enthusiastic over their alleged victory at Panico about a week ago, and the opinion gains ground that the rebels are closing in on Mazatlan and will take that port again soon. Mazatlan has large stocks of American and foreign canned and package goods which the rebels are eager to seize, and they were taken away from Culiacan just before they sacked that city. With Mazatlan in their possession, they could easily secure arms and ammunition from any part of the world. Again in Madero's Favor. The government organs of Mexico City have announced that Renteria, the Maderista governor who was run out of Sinaloa by the rebels in March in a movement directed especially against him and not against Madero, has again won Madero's favor and he will be sent back to Sinaloa to serve out his term, which expires in September. This announcement caused general disgust in Sinaloa, where he is hated, and discounts the hopes of the pacification of the state by Gen. Delgado, the military governor, who was sworn in on the 14th. Little is known of Gen. Delgado, but because he is from the outside and

has had no connection with any of the rival factions in Sinaloa it was hoped he could restore order and would be given the necessary time to do it.

Volunteers of Gomez's Army. The vicissitudes of the revolutionary game in Mexico are aptly illustrated in the case of Manuel Zarzuela, who is now doing time as a private soldier in the federal army somewhere around Torreon.

Zarzuela was a merchant in Culiacan in sympathy with the rebels, and when the rebels captured the city, April 17, he was named as their governor. After the rebels looted and evacuated the city they were pursued by government troops. Zarzuela happened to be in a band that was captured on May 4. He was sent as a prisoner of war to Mexico City, where he volunteered, had his head shaved and was "muzzed" per custom with such "volunteers," and went to the front.

Don Maculo de la Vega, formerly proprietor of the hotel Rosales in Culiacan, was captured with Zarzuela, and he also has the honor of serving his country as a noble "volunteer" in the federal army. These are typical of the recent enlistments in the army. Zarzuela and de la Vega are only two of the many who went the same route from Culiacan, and are now "volunteers" in the federal army.

COL. OROZCO SENDS HIS FAMILY TO THIS CITY. Members of the family of Col. Pascual Orozco, military commander of Juarez, and father of the rebel general, have taken up their residence in El Paso. They moved from Juarez on account of the many rumors prevalent that federals are gathering in the vicinity of the rebel port. They are living on Mesa avenue.

EFFORT TO SAVE SHATTERED LEG OF IMMIGRATION MAN. A desperate effort is being made to save the shattered leg of immigration inspector Ray Gould, who accidentally shot himself Wednesday night. The steel-jacketed, .45-caliber bullet passed through his left leg just below the thigh. Four inches of the bone was shattered by the missile and the attending physicians are making an effort to prevent the amputation of the leg by the use of a silver plate. Gould was eating dinner in a Spanish restaurant when his revolver struck on the chair, striking it in the holster, the gun was discharged, the ball striking him in the upper part of the leg and passing through the bone. Inspector Gould's wife died recently at the eruptive hospital of smallpox.

MIDLAND IS TO HAVE ANOTHER WHOLESALE HOUSE. Midland, Texas, June 21.—Another wholesale house will shortly open in Midland. J. M. Jenison has purchased a block of land adjoining the railroad right of way and is erecting a store room. Mr. Jenison will do a jobbing business, strictly dealing in heavy groceries, feed, building material, and ranch supplies.

McGOWN'S BODY IS TAKEN TO AUSTIN

Thirty Members of El Paso Bar Association Attend Departure.

A funeral service for the body of William C. McGown, state representative who shot himself at his home here, was held at Austin. The body was accompanied by Floyd McGown, an attorney of Austin and brother of the deceased official. The widow and mother did not make the trip.

BABY JOINS MOTHER. Surviving the mother one day, Wanda, aged one year, died at Santa Rita, N. M., where Mrs. Howard Golemon died. Mrs. Golemon was the wife of Howard Golemon, of the Chino Copper company, and a daughter of Col. J. C. Tipton, a former El Paso newspaperman. The bodies of mother and child arrived here Friday morning, and funeral services were held Friday afternoon in the chapel at 408 Texas street. Rev. J. E. Abbott officiated. Interment will be made here.
