RAPID WORK MADE ON DAM FOUNDATION. Elephant Butte, N. M., July 2.—Concrete foundations for the great dam are now being placed on that section of the dam west of the river, in the excavation made under the dam. This excavation was nearly 60 feet deep, but the work of filling in the concrete is progressing rapidly. As soon as the channel has completed its work, the second concrete mixer will be put in operation.

An additional room has been made to the power house, the house the machinery for the air compressor plant. The machinery is being installed and will operate the dam.

DOUGLAS URGES A SUFFRAGE ELECTION

Petitions Are Numerously Signed and Forwarded to Phoenix.

Douglas, Ariz., July 2.—Two petitions were sent to Douglas for the purpose of securing signatures to introduce upon the subject of equal suffrage, have been filled with names and forwarded to secretary of state Sidney Cowden.

The state law that all petitions to initiate new laws at the fall election had to be on file with the secretary of state today. These will easily be there on time.

One of the petitions was in the hands of Mrs. Joseph Callisher, who soon had it filled. The other was at the office of the Dispatch and similar good fortune followed its course.

The general feeling in Douglas seems to be that if the women desire to cast a ballot it is not for mere man to say them nay. It is as yet too early to attempt any prediction upon the matter, but it is probable that the amendment will receive hearty local support. In but few cases where signatures were requested were refused.

MARKET OPENS

STRONG; REACTS Gains Quickly Turned to Losses, and Market Closed Irregular.

New York, N. Y., July 2.—Following the conclusion of the second of the great party conventions the market today opened strong. Gains of one to two points were registered by many stocks, which pronounced strength in Steel, Union Pacific, Reading, the Hill issues and Brooklyn Transit.

By midday, however, the market reacted almost violently, gains quickly turning to losses with especial weakness in the speculative favorites.

The market closed irregular. The Grangers followed the lead of the Hill issues in the last hour and Ontario & Western rose over its price of last week, when the dividend was suspended. The leaders and American Tobacco continued under pressure.

WAS HANFORD DRUNK WHILE ON BENCH?

One Witness Says He Was; Others Testify Concerning His Habits.

Seattle, Wash., July 2.—In the house judiciary subcommittee investigation today of United States Judge Cordell Hanford's alleged bibulous proclivities, testimony was brought forth that one night Judge Hanford was apparently intoxicated on the street near the federal building. The judge, swayed from side to side, appeared to be unable to steady himself. "I think he was intoxicated," declared the witness.

Fred Johnson testified that he had seen Judge Hanford on half a dozen occasions when he appeared to be under the influence of intoxicants.

Robert E. Jones, a former newspaper reporter said on one occasion during the Holt murder trial he had seen Judge Hanford on the bench, charged with him to be a state of intoxication. The judge sat with his head resting on his chest and an attorney entering an objection waited 15 seconds for the judge to rouse himself and rule on the motion. The witness said he had seen Judge Hanford apparently intoxicated on a prominent downtown street between midnight and 1 o'clock.

The judge required about the whole width of the 15-foot sidewalk to navigate, the witness stated.

PLAN TO RAISE A \$1000 ROAD FUND

Artesia Man Is Left a Fortune by a Cousin in Germany.

Artesia, N. M., July 2.—At a meeting of the commercial club to consider the building of a road from Artesia to Lovington over the plains, J. T. Patrick, city treasurer, was appointed secretary by subscription, the balance could be secured from the state and county. Secretary Patrick was appointed to solicit subscriptions.

August Strauss has received word that a cousin had died in Germany, leaving about \$100,000 to be divided between him and his brothers. As August is the oldest, under the German law of descent, he will receive more than his share. Hanford apparently departed for Illinois and will go from there to Artesia with his brothers to look after the inheritance.

Artesia postoffice will be raised to a second class office July 1 on account of increased business the past year. Miss Vivian Newkirk will be permanent postmaster and D. E. Doser clerk.

WHEAT PRICE GOES

COOLER WEATHER AND RAINS IN THE NORTHWEST CAUSE DROP.

Chicago, Ill., July 2.—Wheat prices turned in a downward direction today, mainly on account of cooler weather and recent rains in South Dakota and Minnesota. Opening figures ranged from last night's level to 4c lower. September started at \$1.03 1/2 to \$1.03 3/4, and then declined to \$1.03 1/4 to \$1.03 1/2.

The close was steady, 1/4 to 3/4c net lower at \$1.03 1/4 to \$1.03 1/2. Short sellers in corn pounded the market, making advances of the wheat weakness. September opened 1/4 to 3/4c down at 71 to 71 1/2c, and dropped to 70 1/2c.

There was a heavy feeling in the oats trade consequent on the depression of other cereals. September was 1/4 to 1/2c off, at 25 to 25 1/2c, and declined to 24 1/2c.

Provisions showed firmness at first as a result of an advance at the yards, but the market met with plentiful selling orders and soon receded. Initial transactions varied from a shade 10c to 1/2c up, with September delivery \$18.90 for pork; \$10.90 to \$10.92 1/2 for lard, and \$10.57 1/2 for ribs.
