WILD REPORT SENT TO WASHINGTON FROM EL PASO

Washington, D. C., July 5.—Somebody telegraphed a wild report here today from El Paso that Gen. Orozco, the insurgent leader, had planned to direct an artillery fire on the electric light and power plant on the American side of the river at El Paso.

The plant supplies light and power to Juarez as well as El Paso. As Juarez is in undisputed possession of the insurgents, the officials here cannot understand why they should cut off their own light and power unless they intend to deliberately force United States intervention by firing across the border.

Col. Steever, commanding the troops on the Texas border, today telegraphed he had heard that 1,500 rebel soldiers had arrived in Juarez from the south within the last 24 hours.

Governor Colquitt, of Texas, wired that he considered the situation so critical that he has withdrawn the Texas militia from the maneuver camp at Alexandria, La., to guard the border at El Paso.

GOV. FELIX GUERRERREZ ARRIVES ON TROOP TRAIN Governor Felix Guerrerrez, of Chihuahua arrived on a troop train which reached Juarez at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon. The train carried 700 soldiers with their women and children.



FIRE DEPARTMENT IS KEPT ON JUMP

One House Catches Fire Three Times; Firecrackers Blamed.

The almost total loss of the two-story frame residence at 312 Wyoming street, and five other fires, responded to by the central fire department Thursday afternoon and early Friday morning, were credited to the small boy with firecrackers.

The department made three trips to the Wyoming street house, the first one being at 9:03 o'clock Thursday night, the second time at 1:30 o'clock Friday morning and the third one at 2 o'clock Friday morning.

The first fire, resulting from burning firecrackers, did little or no damage. The second time the department was called to the Wyoming residence the strong breeze blowing had whipped the flames again started by firecrackers into a roaring blaze.

The first alarm for a Fourth of July fire was registered at the central fire station at 3:25 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Burning firecrackers lodged between the shed and fence in the rear of the residence at 401 East Nevada street, was given as the cause of the fire.

Skycrocker Causes Fire. A wayward skycrocker started a blaze in the building at 414 South Florence street at 9:26 o'clock Thursday night. The fire was extinguished by the department. There was no damage.

Candle Causes Alarm. A woman residing in a residence in the vicinity of Texas and Octavia streets phoned the central station at 2:15 o'clock Friday morning that there was a fire in the residence at that corner.

The fire was discovered. Investigations disclosed the fact that a man living in the house had retired leaving a candle burning on the dresser.

Trash Pile Abazes. A fire in a trash pile at the intersection of Williams and Wyoming streets called the department out at 2 o'clock Friday morning.

At 11:20 a. m. Friday, an alarm was sent from Virginia and Montana streets, where a residence had been set on fire by fireworks. The roof

was burned partly off and damage was done by water.

At 1:28 a. m. Friday, a chicken coop near the Southwestern shops caught fire in some unaccountable way. The damage was insignificant.

RAINER INJUNCTION CASE COMES NEXT

Congressional Committee Is Progressing Slowly on Hanford Case.

Seattle, Wash., July 5.—With all the private detective and bartender witnesses disposed of, the house judiciary subcommittee when it met today was still far from the end of its effort to learn whether United States district judge Cornelius Hanford is suffering from intoxication or physical weakness and infirmities, when, according to testimony, he doted on street cars, nodded in court and wavered in his walk.

The committee, at a conference with Hanford's attorneys, declared that henceforth only those witnesses would be called who the committee knew could give testimony bearing directly on the subject.

It is expected that all of today will be given up to the accusation of intoxication.

The subcommittee will next take up the injunctions issued by judge Hanford in the so-called "Rainier valley single fare fight."

The restraining order issued by judge Hanford in the alleged collusive suit of the trustees of the Seattle, Renton and Southern Street railway bondholders led to a mass meeting in Dreamland rink in Seattle, August 25, 1911, during the progress of which the judge was denounced by speakers, while a jeering crowd outside hanged an effigy labeled "Hanford."

The arrests which followed the mass meeting will be thoroughly investigated, it is announced by the committee.
