Franchise Request Delayed.



ELKS MAY AGAIN RIDE THE GOAT

Grand Lodge Considering the Restoration of Ancient Custom.

Portland, Ore., July 5.—The Judiciary committee of the Grand Lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks made its third attempt, and the ritual committee its second attempt to get down to business today. Both, however, adjourned without transacting any business, owing to the numerous diversions attendant on the fourth of July.

One of the important questions upon the ritual committee, it was learned, would be to consider the reestablishment of the "goat" as a part of the initiation ceremonies. "Riding the goat," at the behest of the big city lodges, was abolished last year at the grand lodge convention at Atlantic City on the grounds of its lack of dignity. Some of the lodges in small cities and towns demand that it be reestablished as part of the ritual. These lodges declare that the change removed a diversion which in small places where amusements are not numerous, detracted materially from the social side of the order.

Perhaps she thinks to keep a hold on him till she finds a man who suits her better. Not a kind thing to say of a girl, but admitting all their sweetnesses and attractiveness, there are girls of whom the truth is not kind. "Dependent," who writes the following letter, seems to be in a class of men whom we will call "Dangers." The girl keeps him dangling around her; what her final intentions are regarding him no one knows. One can only turn to his own knowledge of women and guess. 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CREEL CATTLE CROSSED.


