DEMING AND MIMBRES VALLEY ARTHUR J. EVANS IN DEMING TELLS OF HIS ARREST BY REBELS AND KILLING OF COLONIST WILLIAM ADAMS

Deming, N. M., July 11.—Arthur J. Evans, who was recently incarcerated at Asencion, Mex., by rebel rurales and who was released Sunday, is in Deming. Mr. Evans states that he is employed by Charles Sparks and wife to take them by automobile to Colonia Diaz to attend the funeral of Mrs. Adams, the mother of Mrs. Sparks. After the trip was arranged, J. F. Sanford also joined the party. At Palomas, Juan Carreon, the customs officer, allowed them to pass, saying that it would be all right, but failed to give them a pass. They set out Monday, reaching Colonia Diaz the same day. Mr. and Mrs. Parks got out of the auto at the Adams home in Colonia Diaz, while Evans drove the car on over to Asencion with Sanford, who desired to go there on business. Evans went to bed, but was soon awakened by Sanford who was under arrest. Sanford, saying that the rurales captain demanded a pass. Evans was thrown in jail, and Sanford, who had been previously put into jail, was released. Young Sanford, a son of J. F. Sanford, interested in Evans's behalf and was thrown in jail and fined \$15.

Finally the engine went dead and refused to be cranked up, and we had to get a team to pull us into Asencion. I was again put in jail, but at nightfall two Mexican citizens whom I had never known came and offered to go my bond and finally prevailed upon the rurales to release me. I stayed with one whose name as near as I can make out, is Juan Saquinatas, and the other's first name is Antonio. "I was kept under bond five days. I was taken into court three times to give testimony concerning the killing of Adams, the officer who did it being on trial. I think he was acquitted. In the meantime, A. L. Boyd had arrived with Juan Carreon, the customs officer at Palomas, with a pass for us, and we were released. I found out that Carreon had sent a pass by mail to the rurales having us in charge, which pass the officer failed to recognize. I learned afterwards, also, that Sanford had struck out of immediately after the killing of Adams for Columbus, and was later overtaken by his son on horseback, and they both came into Columbus, and gave out the news of my predicament. "Vote Bonds for School House." Bonds have been voted in school district No. 9 for the erection of another school building. The capital issue schoolhouse will soon be completed, making four schoolhouses in the Honddale district. The Deming school board has made provision for paying a teacher for the Tunis school eight miles west of town. A. W. Garner, of Guadalupe, Mex., is here prospecting. W. J. Hewitt, of Albuquerque, is here on business. George W. Champion, of Albuquerque, was putting in a test well in the vicinity of Arena, was in Deming today on business. J. M. Williams, John Hund, Earl Van Sickle, A. L. Taylor, W. E. Blackoberts, Reed & Carter, P. K. Connaway and W. J. Wamel loaded four carloads of beans this week, their last season's harvest. They were shipped to commission men in El Paso. E. O. Misner, recently from Kansas, has rented one of the Killinger buildings on Silver avenue and will put in a stock of hardware and implements on August 1. George Solmar, who has been occupying part of this building, will move his tailoring shop to the Kuebush building several doors north on Silver avenue. New Well Tested. The new irrigation well of W. W. Reese, eight miles south of town, was pumped for the first time and developed easily 1,000 gallons of water per minute. This will be increased to 1,200 gallons per minute, as soon as a proper engine is installed. At present the pump is operated by a traction engine, water being drawn from the well by the character of load. Besides testing this well, Mr. Reese is testing the Traylor pump, a new pump in this locality. It is not a centrifugal pump, but on the propeller order, the water being forced out by spirals. M. S. Kell, manager for the western irrigation department of the Traylor Engineering & Manufacturing company, is putting this pump in under an ironical guarantee of very high efficiency. The pump is designed to go into a 6, 8 or 12-inch casing without a pit, and is built in sections to accommodate varying levels of the water. The water stands in the Reese well at 55 feet, and when pumping 1,000 gallons per minute, lowers to 67 feet. Mr. Reese expresses himself as well pleased with the test so far as land pumped. He has 320 acres of land grubbed, 160 acres of which has been plowed twice, harrowed and leveled. All this work, except the grubbing, has been done since May 1 with the huge 45-horsepower traction engine. Mr. Reese is very enthusiastic in his commendation of the tractor as an engine suited to the needs of the large farmer in the Mimbres valley. Superintendent Summers, of the Santa Fe, passed through here en route to Hurley on business. Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Laughlin, of El Paso, passed through Deming en route to Faywood, where they will spend several weeks in recreation. The Atkins hay barn caught fire, but was promptly extinguished by the Deming fire department. Charles G. Roshier, of Baton Rouge, La., is here looking for a headlight. J. M. PUSHING WORK ON SIX APARTMENTS

Two City Residences and a Valley Tract Have Changed Hands.

Work on the six new apartment houses in El Paso now under construction is progressing with all possible speed, and already the Caples apartment house on East Boulevard, near the corner of Octavia, is receiving the finishing touches and the fixtures are being installed. The Booth apartment house on Wyoming street has had the work on it stopped for a few days on account of court proceedings, but these have so far been settled and the builders are at work on the building again and are erecting the first story. The building will cost in the neighborhood of \$21,000. "The Palms," the apartment house being erected on West Missouri, now has its three stories constructed and the roof of the building will be put on in a few days. All of the excavation work on the Booth and Davis apartment houses at the corner of Octavia and Boulevard, has been completed and the builders are now putting in the foundation work. Work on the Wallace house and the apartment house being erected by W. Rooking at the junction of Roosevelt street and Missouri is progressing rapidly. Plans for a new addition to El Paso are being made by F. E. Haddock and W. C. Porter, who recently purchased 10 acres directly east of the Val Verde addition for \$15,000 from F. D. Haddock. Advertisement for SEARCHES PLAINS FOR FOSSIL HORSES. Many Farm Land Deals Are Made in Plainview Country. Plainview, Tex., July 11.—The expedition from Yale university in search of fossil horses has arrived in the Plains country and is now located in Briscoe county, about seven miles from Silverton. The expedition is under the charge of professor Richard S. Lyde, a paleontologist and author of "The Evolution of the Horse." This book shows that the early horse was about the size of a cat and that the equine family has been developing in stature ever since, hence the enormous bones that are so frequently found in this section must be of some mammoth, and certainly not of the early horse. The Otis Reeves Realty company has sold 160 acres near Seth Ward college to J. C. Muss, of Colorado, for \$8,000; also 320 acres in the southern part of Hale county to C. A. Carlton, of Colorado, for \$4,800; also 1,200 acres near Plainview to parties from northern states. Two irrigation wells will be put down soon on these properties. Many thousands of acres have been purchased this spring in the Plains country through this firm by parties from northern states. A New York firm bought the Price & Day farm in the center of the county last week at \$22 per acre.
