
to count out 10 faults in the male sex, the faults she considers gravest are those faults which affect a man's value as a good citizen rather than as a husband or lover.



**U. S. LEADS WORLD IN OLYMPIC GAMES**

Gains 120 Points—Sweden Second—Runner Killed. King Gives Prizes.

Stockholm, Sweden, July 15.—The score in all Olympic events is:

United States, 129; Sweden, 79; England, 58; Germany, 31; Finland, 28; France, 21; South Africa, 16; Denmark, 13; Italy, 13; Canada, 11; Norway, 10; Australia, 9; Hungary, 8; Belgium, 7; Greece, 4; Russia, 3; Austria, 3; Holland, 2.

America First in Two Events. America won first in two of the leading events at today's Olympic games, the 100 meter relay race and the decathlon, and second place in the 800 meter swimming final, thus scoring altogether eight points.

Sweden added 19 points to her total; Finland, 13 points; England, 6 points; Germany 5 points; Austria, 3 points; the swimming event, 3 points; France, two points; and Austria, 1 point.

James Thorpe, of the Indian school, performed a remarkable feat in winning the decathlon and proved his general all around ability as an athlete.

King Gustav at 5 o'clock this afternoon presented the prizes to the winners of the various competitions. The scene was a very brilliant one, as thousands of athletes from many different nationalities gathered in front of the stand.

Death of Runner Causes Gloom. Gloom was cast over the spectators and participants in the Olympic games when it became known that the only fortunate runner in yesterday's historic Marathon race, F. Lazaro, had died in the hospital this morning. He suffered from sunstroke during yesterday's race and fell out on the return journey after returning 19 miles.
