WORK ON NEW LAS CRUCES BUILDING

New Cold Storage Plant Being Constructed—New Fire Station.

The office of The Herald for Las Cruces is in the Postoffice news store, Desmar Bros. This firm will deliver The Herald each night at the regular rate of 60 cents a month.

Las Cruces, N. M., July 19.—Work began this morning on the new brick store building on the corner of Main street and the Plaza, where the Sam Bean building was burned several months ago.

Contractors are installing the machinery in May & Martin's cold storage plant. This plant will be large enough to cool three rooms 10x12 feet in size and the expense of running the plant will not be over 25 per cent of the cost of ice for a box of the same size.

The valley was visited by a little shower Thursday that cooled the air, although not much water fell. The heavy rains in the mountains to the east of town have caused the arroyos to flood the county road between here and the college and it is too muddy for travel by automobile.

The necessity for a building in which to store the hose cart and other fire fighting equipment has made it necessary for the town trustees to let a contract for a building to be erected at the rear of the Bowman Bank & Trust company, facing on Griggs street, which will be the heart of the business district and easily reached from all parts of town.

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CORONER'S INQUEST IS HELD AT HAYDEN

Newton Is Held For Death of His Wife Near Troy, Ariz.

Hayden, Ariz., July 19.—Messrs. Rosenbaum, Hatch, Hackwood, Hillman, Hancock and Soutter were impeached for the jury in the inquest over the death of Mrs. Newton, a Mexican woman, who was shot near Troy, Arizona. Josefa Gonzalez was the chief witness, she being the only one who was present at the time the shooting took place.

Testimony proved that the killing took place about four miles from Hayden, the being near Newton, Kelvin to Troy in Pinal county. Enrique Newton, the 15 year old stepson of the Newtons, was called to the stand and his statements practically corroborated those of the other witness. He stated that his father and mother had a quarrel on the night prior to the murder. Walter Gibson, local sheriff, to whom Newton gave himself up, testified to what Newton had said, and which was that Newton had killed his wife and had then tried to commit suicide. The jury after a very short session handed in a verdict charging the murder to Newton. The jury used was a 44 caliber Smith & Wesson, which is now in the hands of the local assistant state attorney.

Thomas Calhoun, up to the present time an attaché of the Hayden Supply company, has left to return to Arizona, and hereafter hand out supplies in the warehouse of the American Smelting and Refining company.

CRUCES MAN AT HEAD OF SANTA FE SCHOOLS

Wife of State Senator Mabry Dies in Santa Fe.

Santa Fe, N. M., July 19.—Prof. J. H. Wagner for several terms superintendent of schools at Santa Fe, has been elected superintendent of the public schools at Santa Fe at \$2,000 a year, and has accepted. Former superintendent of the public schools, James E. Clark had been elected to the place several weeks ago, but last week declined to accept.

Mrs. Winifred White Mabry, wife of state senator T. J. Mabry, of Clovis, died at the Pinyon Hotel, at Santa Fe, of peritonitis. Senator Mabry returned in time from a campaign in Oklahoma to be at the bedside when death came. Besides him, a 14 months old child survives.
