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ROOSEVELT IS FIGHTING BOSSES

same time to insist that his representatives, by trickery and sharp practice, secure for him the six delegates at large from Ohio in the primaries had gone 47,000 against him.

There was one essential difference between the attitude of the big Republican and the big Democratic bosses at Baltimore. The former greatly preferred certain delegates to my nomination; the latter were willing to accept any nomination rather than face certain party defeat.

In my case the appeal was made straight to the people against the bosses and the fight was on that issue. In but one or two states had Dr. Wilson's cause been triumphant in a square fight with the bosses against by voters had hardly been any fight made along these lines.

It was to persuade the bosses themselves into nominating Dr. Wilson. Dr. Wilson's victory would not mean the dethronement of these men; it would mean their perpetuation in power. My election would mean that Mr. Penrose, Mr. Barnes and Mr. Guggenheim would be definitely eliminated from political control of their states.

In summing up his second article Col. Roosevelt declares in addition to the professional politicians and interests who oppose him, and to the respectable support that comes from individuals who are misinformed, there is a considerable body of support from respectable men who do know something of the issue at stake.

MCCOMBS AND MACK HOLD CONFERENCE

Preparations Being Made to Open Headquarters in West.

Seagirt, N. J., July 19.—William F. McCombs, the new chairman of the Democratic national committee, met Norman E. Mack, the retiring chairman, New York, July 18, to discuss a transfer of the committee's files and documents to the new officers.

After selecting the New York headquarters, Mr. McCombs will go to Chicago with and discuss the arrangements for the opening of headquarters there. No definite decision had been made regarding the location of the western office, but it was believed Denver or San Francisco will be chosen.

The appointment of a vice chairman probably will be made before the campaign committee adjourns Monday.

It is the feeling of the committee that Hermann Ridder, treasurer of the last national committee, should retain that office.

WILSON NAMES HIS CAMPAIGN GENERALS

Committee of 14 Selected to Cooperate With Chairman McCombs.

Seagirt, N. J., July 19.—The Democratic campaign committee, which will have supreme charge of the presidential campaign, was named last night by governor Wilson. It consists of 14 members, with William F. McCombs, the chairman of the Democratic national committee, as chairman.

The members are: Robert S. Hedges, N. J.; Joseph P. Kamp, N. C.; Robert L. Ewing, Louisiana; A. Mitchell Palmer, Pennsylvania; Joseph E. Davies, Wisconsin; W. E. DeLoach, Oregon, all of whom are members of the national committee, and senator A. O. Gore of Oklahoma; James B. Burison, of Texas; William G. McAdoo, of New York City.

NEW PARTY FOUNDED ONLY ON ROOSEVELT, SAY WORKS. Washington, D. C., July 19.—Senator Works of California, yesterday forgoing the immunities of the public life of that state who called a progressive party to the Republican state primary in California, declared that a new party is "not founded upon principles, but upon Roosevelt, and when dead beyond resurrection."

A general committee of arrangements with various subcommittees, was appointed today. Ralph C. Otis, who has been at Oyster Bay consulting with Col. Roosevelt, was made chairman.

ANOTHER OFFICIAL RESIGNS TO JOIN ROOSEVELT PARTY. Washington, D. C., July 19.—Granville Porteus, assistant to the director of the Marine Corps, yesterday resigned to join the Roosevelt progressive party.

Herbert Knox Smith, who resigned as commissioner of corporations in the new party, formally retired from office today. He will confer with Col. Roosevelt at Oyster Bay on Saturday and later expect to confer after the new party movement in Connecticut.
