## District Attorney vs. Defendant's Lawyer

On the 27th of this month the citizens of this judicial district will decide who shall be the judge of this (34th) district for the next four years.

The two candidates are totally unlike in almost every particular. Mr. Nealon served one year as assistant district attorney and has now served eighteen months as district attorney. During this time he has established a reputation as a vigorous, fearless and successful prosecutor, yet one who is eminently fair and never persecutes. Two of the men he has prosecuted have paid him the highest tribute that can be paid to any man holding this position.

One of these men—a leader in crime, the brains of the band of criminal conspirators who made this city their headquarters a few years ago—when Mr. Nealon was making his campaign for district attorney two years ago asked this question: "Is Nealon likely to be elected?" The answer was, "He is." He then asked, "Then, I had better leave here, hadn't I?" "Yes," was the answer, and he went Colorado and El Paso lost an inhabitant probably the brainiest criminal that ever infested the city.

The other tribute was paid during this campaign by a man whom he had prosecuted. This man said: "Nealon can't be elected. He has sent too many people to Huntsville (the penitentiary)."

There is no better training for a judicial position than the district attorney's office, and it is so recognized all over the United States. It has been a stepping stone to judicial honors since the foundation of the republic. Why? Because to be a successful district attorney requires a thorough knowledge of the principles of law and the rules of evidence so that reversible error may not creep into the case and cause a reversal of his case after he has secured a conviction. He requires a thorough knowledge of the law of evidence that he may be able to meet all objection, secure the admission of all legal evidence and exclude that which is illegal. The same rigid care and exhaustive knowledge is required in the drawing of indictments. This knowledge is invaluable to him when he becomes a judge as it enables him to guard against reversals and protect the people from useless waste of money in new trials as well as maintaining that respect for the law that comes from its prompt enforcement.

The history of our courts shows that to be a successful defendant's lawyer does not require this knowledge or this capability. Indeed, history shows that men with such qualities soon find their practice growing into more lucrative and more congenial lines. The defendant's lawyer does not have to guard against error. In fact, the more there is injected into the case the better for him. Usually his success lies not so much in his knowledge of law as in his ability to appeal to the prejudices of his fellow citizens, his knowledge of their prejudices beforehand to guide him in selecting his juries and his ability to appeal to their prejudices to divert their minds from the guilt of the prisoner to other circumstances and, when he has no legitimate defense, to slur and slander the witnesses for the state regardless of their character and regardless of their being ladies and gentlemen. In other words, his success often depends on his ability to make black appear white.

Why do members of the bar—successful, brainy men of character—so seldom appear in criminal cases and usually then in those that do not involve moral turpitude? It is because of the unpleasant and degrading influences that surround this practice. Of necessity, the lawyer must come in contact with his client, a criminal, and with his client's witnesses, usually drawn from the criminal classes, and frequently those female characters that retain only the virtue of loyalty. He recognizes the degrading influence of such associates, of testimony which his judgment tells him is often perjured, of manufactured alibis, of prisoners' statements cooked and changed to meet the testimony of the state. Recognizing the blighting influence of such associations on the strongest character, he shuns them as he would a leper's touch. (Advertisement.)

dition that congress now was seeking some way to abolish.

Sixteen Postmasters for N. M. Named.  
President Taft today sent to the senate nominations of 16 postmasters in New Mexico including Robert W. Hopkins at Albuquerque; Ignacio Lopez at Las Vegas, and Arthur H. Rockafellow at Roswell.

Sulzer for Battleship.  
Chairman Sulzer of the house committee on foreign affairs, has written chairman Burleson, of the house Democratic caucus, declaring his intention to vote a battleship, regardless of the caucus which declared for no ships this year.

"I have told Mr. Burleson that whenever my vote is directed by patriotic motives, I will not be bound by a scant majority in the caucus," said Mr. Sulzer today.

Mr. Sulzer declared 25 or 30 Democrats who participated in the last caucus were ready to vote for one or more battleships.

"If enough Republicans support the senate program, we can pass it through the house," said Mr. Sulzer. He now is circulating a petition for another caucus.

The caucus endorsed in general terms a sugar bill, which senator Williams later presented to the senate as a substitute to be voted on tomorrow. It would make a reduction of 32 1/2 per cent on refined and unrefined sugar, a reduction of 40 per cent on molasses, and abolish the Dutch standard test, and the differentials in duty now existing.

### THREE BIG SUITS FOR DAMAGE FILED

One Man Asks For \$30,000; Two \$10,000 Suits Are Filed.

Alleging that he was injured by reason of a faulty step on one of its dining cars, John Smith is suing the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway company for \$30,000. The suit was filed Thursday afternoon in the 24th district court. The plaintiff sets out that he was employed by the defendant company as a watchman, and a part of his duties were to board the dining cars to ascertain that all the meals served thereon were accounted for, and the meal tickets properly punched. The plaintiff stated that on February 16 he was performing these duties, and when alighting from the dining car, the step, which he charged was faulty, gave way, and he was thrown violently to the ground and injured.

**Claims Injury in Runaway.**  
Oliver Scott is asking \$10,000 from the El Paso Electric Railway company in a suit filed Thursday afternoon in the 24th district court. The plaintiff alleges that he was engaged as a carpenter on July 29, 1910, in repairing the Santa Fe street bridge over which the defendant ran its cars. The plaintiff stated that by reason of the defendant running its car on the bridge while he was working, one of the spans of the bridge broke, and he was thrown to the ground and injured.

**Claims Injury in Runaway.**  
Alleging that a horse which was furnished him became frightened, running away and injuring him, H. F. Cleiser is asking the sum of \$10,000 damages in a suit filed Thursday afternoon in the 41st district court against J. H. Nations Meat & Supply

### company and against J. H. Nations individually.

The plaintiff alleges that he was employed by the company to solicit orders, and that in pursuance to an agreement the company was to furnish him a gentle horse. Cleiser said that as a result of the horse running away he was injured to the extent of the amount sued for.

### PREPARATIONS MADE FOR THE ELECTION

All paraphernalia appertaining to primary elections, such as the official ballots, pencils, and ballot boxes have been stored in the county clerk's office and will be delivered to the election judges of the various precincts throughout the city and the county, in time for these judges to be prepared to open their polling places at 8 o'clock Saturday morning.

Polling booths were moved into the city hall Friday morning. There were four of them and they were placed in the main hall. These will be put into the city hall in precinct No. 11, and those persons residing in this precinct will cast their votes Saturday at the city hall.

**JOWA DEMOCRATS TO SUBMIT PLATFORM TO REFERENDUM VOTE**  
Cedar Rapids, Iowa, July 26.—Iowa Democrats put the principles of the initiative and referendum into practice when, last night, just before the adjournment of the state convention, it was decided unanimously to submit the progressive platform to the referendum vote of the rank and file of the party. In addition to the platform the convention utilized its final session in nominating two candidates for the supreme court—Maurice O'Connor of Fort Dodge, and John E. Craig, of Lee county.

**MIMIC WARFARE IN WYOMING.**  
Laramie, Wyo., July 26.—A midnight attack between the Red and Blue armies at the Pole mountain maneuvers will be the program for tonight, the first of such maneuvers to be held this year. The Red army, consisting of the Ninth cavalry and the Fourth field artillery, will attempt to surprise the Blue, consisting of the Eleventh infantry, using army strategy assisted by telegraph and signals.
