DENOUNCES DEMOCRATS FOR FIGHT ON WARSHIPS

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 26.—An attack on the Democratic majority in the house of representatives for refusing to adopt the two battleships program, was made today by Col. Roosevelt. He declared that the upbuilding of the navy must go on if this country is to maintain its position among the nations of the world.

"Since the Democrats have voted down the battleships," he said, "if they are logical they also will vote to abandon the Panama canal. It is an outrage, from the standpoint of national honor and interest, to go on with the Panama canal at all unless we both fortify it and keep up an adequate navy."

SEARCHED, DESPITE THE CERTIFICATE

Sick Sister of Col. Ponce Is Carried From Car by Soldiers

Despite her protests and the fact that she presented a physician's certificate that she was too ill to leave the street car to be searched, Miss Lupe Ponce, sister of Col. Demetrio Ponce of the rebel army, was placed in a chair by six United States soldiers Thursday evening at the Stanton street bridge, searched in the tent by the woman inspector in the employ of the Mexican government and placed on the car again. Because of the excitement resulting from the action of the United States soldiers in taking her from the car, Miss Ponce says her condition is much worse and that she is under the care of a physician.

Hearing that her brother was expecting to leave with the rebel troops, Miss Ponce says she went to Juarez on a car, although she had been seriously ill. In order to avoid having to leave the car she obtained a certificate from her physician saying that she was physically unable to submit to the search. When this was presented and Miss Ponce insisted upon being searched in the car, she says she was placed in a chair and carried off the car by the soldiers.


