HUNTER TO BUILD ON MONTANA STREET

Permit Is Issued For New Masonic Temple, to Cost \$112,000.

Dr. John R. Hunter has contracted with the Mayfield Realty company to erect a bungalow for him in the 2200 block of Montana street. The house will contain five rooms and a basement and will cost about \$3,100. It will be occupied by Dr. Hunter as a home.

Hughson Buys Home.
E. O. Hughson has purchased from the Mayfield Realty company a five room house at 2871 Rio Grande street. It is of the California bungalow type and the selling price was \$3,450. It is now under construction.

Brick Work Under Way.
The brick work on the home which is being erected for H. M. Whitfield at the corner of Rio Grande and Piedras streets adjoining the house just sold to Mr. Hughson is well under way. The house, which will cost about \$3,100, will be completed in six weeks. The Mayfield Realty company is building the house. Two other houses being erected by the same company in the same block are rapidly being completed and one will be finished in about 10 days. They are both modern bungalows with hardwood floors and the built in features. One has been sold to Miss Nettie Witson.

Plasterers at Work.
The house being erected for W. G. Roe at 2801 Boulevard is having the plasterers at work and will be completed in 30 days. The house is being erected by the Mayfield Realty company.

Issue Permits for Masonic Temple.
The permit for the erection of the new Masonic Temple, at the corner of N. El Paso and Missouri streets, in the city was issued by the city to J. I. Hewitt and Sons, joint contractors with Otto P. Kroeger, who will erect the building. The permit calls for the estimated cost of the building to be \$112,000 and the building to cover a ground space of 62x28 feet and to be 105 feet high. Work on the building will start next Monday morning. The plans for the new temple have already been completed by Trost and Trost.

The building committee of the Masonic lodge will break ground for the new Masonic Temple Monday morning. T. C. Lea will remove the first shovel full of earth which will be preserved as a part of the record of the new temple. The ground breaking ceremony will be attended by a number of the lodge members.

Finishing Work On Home.
The finishing work on the home being erected for Harry Walz in the 2,000 block of Montana street, is in progress and the painters have already begun their work. The house will be completed in 15 days. The construction is being done by the Mayfield Realty company.

At Work on Interior.
The carpenters are at work on the house which is being built for Dr. T. E. Crowder in the 1,300 block of Rio Grande, doing the interior finishing work. The house will be finished and ready to be occupied in 30 days. The Mayfield Realty company is building the house.

To Build Bungalow.
Miss Jane McCardle will have a bungalow erected at the corner of Rio Grande and Newman streets. The work will start on it in a few days. The bungalow will cost \$4,000. James L. Hewitt and Sons will be the building contractor.

Cagney Buys Cottage.
John Cagney has purchased a six room cottage located at 1721 Montana street from H. M. Whitson. The price paid was \$4,750. Cassidy and Davidson made the sale.

Two Brick Bungalows.
Two brick bungalows will be erected by the Phoenix-El Paso building company on Clarendon street in block 188 of the East El Paso addition. The cost of each of the houses will be \$2,000.

Buy Two Lots.
E. O. Holly has bought from E. W. Mitchell 40x140 feet on Hill street for \$400. Hawkins Bros. made the sale. The land is in block 120.

Trades Residence Will Build.
Mrs. E. C. French has traded her residence on Montana street to J. G. McNary for six lots on Montana and Rio Grande streets and upon which she will build a residence to cost \$14,000. The lots which were obtained by Mrs. French faces both Montana and Rio Grande streets, having a frontage of three lots on each street. These lots were valued at \$10,000 and a cash consideration of \$4,000 was included in the trade. Work will start on the construction of the new residence Thursday and it will be occupied by Mrs. French in the fall.
