PLATFORM FAVORS RADICAL CHANGES

"Progressives" of Arizona Select 15 Delegates to National Convention.

Phoenix, Ariz., July 31.—At the state convention of the Progressive party, held in this city yesterday, the following delegates to the national convention at Chicago were selected: W. O. Tuttle, Adolph Baatz, Gila county; S. Fisher, Pearl C. Hayes, Dwight B. Heard, George U. Young, Maricopa county; Dan Worth, Mohave county; Thomas Marshall, Ben Daniels, Pima county; E. K. Cuning, Pearl Farenhill, Santa Cruz; Frank Townsend, Yuma; Wiley Woodson, Pinal; A. L. Cummings, Greenlee. The delegates are bound by iron clad instructions to vote for Roosevelt for the presidential nomination. The platform severely arraigns the old parties, particularly the Republican, asserting they are boss ridden, and declares for recall of the judiciary, recall of judicial decisions, initiative and referendum, preferential primaries and all other reforms that have recently been mentioned. Although 15 delegates to the convention were named, the state will have but three votes, giving each delegate one-fifth of a vote. The state convention was rather slimly attended, four counties having no representation at all, and some others but one delegate a piece.

REPUBLICAN ROW IN STATE OF NEBRASKA

Factions Part Company and Hold Two Conventions at Lincoln.

Lincoln, Neb., July 31.—Republicans of Nebraska parted company yesterday, holding two distinct conventions, adopting opposite declarations of principles, selecting two state committees, and paving the way for two state tickets. The break came after the seating by the executive committee of the old state committee of a majority of the Progressive delegates whose seats had been contested by followers for president Taft. This action gave the Roosevelt Progressive faction control of the convention. The Progressives thereupon selected governor Aldrich chairman and one of his first rulings was to declare out of order a resolution declaring the test of Republican fealty to the national ticket. The ruling caused an uproar and protests, and when chairman Aldrich insisted on adhering to it, Taft left the hall to the accompaniment of jeers and cheering by the Progressives. Following the split, the proceedings in the main convention went through with a rush. The resolutions adopted by the Progressives are silent as to national and state candidates. The bolting Taft delegates marched to another building and organized a new convention. They elected a new state committee. This committee was empowered to fill all vacancies on the state ticket, which means, according to those present, that a second set of Republican nominees will be put in the field.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY IS HELD IN PECOS COUNTY

Fort Stockton, Tex., July 31.—A Republican primary of Pecos county was held here Tuesday under the call of the state chairman, for the purpose of electing officers of the county central committee, and selecting delegates to the state convention to meet at Dallas, August 13. F. E. Grimes was selected chairman, and Joe Schlegel, secretary of the county committee with Mark Adams and George Calvert as delegates to the state convention. The primary was well attended, and the officers and delegates elected are all active Republicans and strong supporters of president Taft.

CALIFORNIA THIRD PARTIES START TO CHICAGO CONVENTION

San Francisco, Calif., July 31.—Headed by governor Johnson, today boarded the train at Sacramento, and with Charles S. Wheeler and Philip Barcroft, of San Francisco, the two California delegates to the Republican convention who were unseated by the national convention, in the party, California's delegation to the convention of the National Progressive party at Chicago, August 3 left for that city today on a special train.

GOVERNOR WILSON CONFERES WITH WILLIAM G. McADOO

Sea Girt, N. J., July 31.—Governor Wilson had a long conference today with William G. McAdoo concerning his notification for the presidency to be held here August 7. Representative Redfield, of Brooklyn, is expected here for a conference with the governor on the tariff plank of the platform.

CONNECTICUT BULL MOOSE FOLLOWERS SELECT DELEGATES

New Haven, Conn., July 31.—Believers in the Progressive movement met in mass convention yesterday and chose 49 delegates to the Chicago convention instructed for Roosevelt for president, and voted that a state ticket should be placed in the field.

ENTHUSIASM FOR TAFT IN COLORADO

Assembly Meets in Denver to Nominate Presidential Electors.

Denver, Colo., July 31.—The first Republican state assembly to nominate presidential electors and state officers to be submitted to the voters at the primaries early in September was held here today. Previous to calling the assembly to order it was apparent that the supporters of president Taft would control at least so far as presidential electors were concerned. The mention of the name of president Taft by temporary chairman Frank C. Goudy, started a demonstration of his declaration that "no cleaner, no braver, no more able man ever occupied the white house than William Howard Taft."

THIRD PARTY IN MISSOURI TO NOMINATE COUNTY TICKETS

Kansas City, Mo., July 31.—Congressional and county candidates will be nominated by the Progressive party in Missouri this year. This was ordered by the state Progressive convention here today, after a stormy discussion that occupied the entire morning session. A fusion ticket also will be nominated in St. Louis.

SOUTHERN DEMOCRAT TO BE ROOSEVELT'S RUNNING MATE

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 31.—A movement is on foot within the National Progressive party to name a Democrat from the south as Col. Roosevelt's running mate. Col. Roosevelt said today.

ANOTHER PRESIDENTIAL ELECTOR CONTEMPLATES RESIGNING

Madison, Wis., July 31.—Col. John Hicks, of Oshkosh, yesterday asked secretary of state Frazier to whom he should resign as a Republican presidential elector. Col. Hicks asked that the matter be made clear, because a large number of electors regularly appointed will resign because they are not in harmony with the Taft ticket. Secretary Frazier referred the matter to the attorney general.

SIX HUNDRED READY TO HELP THIRD PARTY CONVENTION

Portland, Me., July 31.—Six hundred supporters of Col. Roosevelt are expected to participate tonight in the first convention of the Progressive party in this state to choose 12 delegates and name six presidential electors.

IDAHOO PROGRESSIVES FAIL TO NOMINATE STATE TICKET

St. Anthony, Idaho, July 31.—Ending one of the most bitter fights in the history of Idaho politics, in which provisional committee man, Arthur H. Allen, lost his fight, the Progressive party closed its convention last night without nominating a state ticket.

DOVER PROGRESSIVES IN CONVENTION TODAY

Dover, Del., July 31.—The Progressive state convention met here today to organize the new party and elect three delegates to the Progressive national convention at Chicago.

WOMAN WINS COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT'S PLACE

Austin, Texas, July 31.—Miss Maude Douglas, a teacher in the public schools here, was chosen county school superintendent in this county, defeating Wade Smith, the present incumbent.

COLQUITT'S LEAD IN EL PASO IS LARGE

Beats Ramsey Almost 2000 Votes in El Paso County Primaries.

The election returns tabulated by county chairman W. B. Ware up to date show the following results: For senator: Randall, 224; Shepard, 1,136; Walters, 2,311; Zollner, 162. For governor: Colquitt, 3,732; Ramsey, 1,122. For lieutenant governor: Imboden, 1,127; Mayes, 1,174. These returns are from the 26 boxes in the county. Mr. Ware began the work of tabulating the returns Wednesday and expects to complete the work this afternoon. Having had the supervision of the anti campaign on his hands, and the duty of receiving the election returns, he stated Tuesday that he was too exhausted to get out the state reports sooner.

WILL CONFER WITH PRESIDENT PHINNEY

The interurban committee will have a meeting with M. M. Phinney, president of the Electric Railway company as soon as he arrives from the east. Mr. Phinney is expected this week for an inspection of the right-of-way of the line and will go over the entire project with the committee before the actual construction work begins.

COMPANIES ASK FOR REDUCTIONS OF RATES

Rates in Texas Cause Complaints, Declare State Insurance Companies.

Austin, Tex., July 31.—Formal application for a reduction on mercantile risks of approximately 25 percent was made today to the state insurance board by the Commonwealth Fire Insurance company of Dallas and four other Texas fire companies. The companies advise the state insurance board that the present rates have caused general dissatisfaction among the insurers over that state. When asked what action would be taken by the board on the applications, secretary Pollard said that he had to confer with the board first. He could not say whether or not at this time the board would grant the request. A hearing may be ordered on the question. This reduction has been ordered by the companies, but is not effective until the board gives its approval.

POSSE HOT ON TRAIL OF JAIL BREAKERS

One of Them Wounded and Captured; the Bandits Are Well Armed.

Craig, Colo., July 31.—Charles Frazer, one of the three prisoners who escaped from the jail here last night, was wounded by a change shot from the gun of a deputy sheriff, and was captured near here today. William Sartelle, alias William Morgan, and Andrew Comstock, the former with Frazer, said to be leaders of the notorious "hole in the wall" gang of desperadoes, have secured arms and ammunition, and are riding toward the Wyoming line pursued by a strong posse. Sheriff Ledford has offered a reward of \$200 for the capture of the men dead or alive.
