WITNESSES CONTINUE TO TELL OF INTIMIDATION AT THE POLLS

Continued from page 1.

Montoya, and Gonzales well. I saw them around the polls there all day. I observed Montoya, Manuel Gonzales, and another stop the people who were waiting there to vote. Montoya was talking to them. I was 20 feet away. I could not hear what he said to them. The rope was at the edge of the sidewalk and Montoya was about 10 or 15 feet from the rope. I saw him talking to voters all day long.

"I know that there was a ring and anti-ring ticket. Montoya was a candidate on the ring ticket, like Alderete was a candidate on the anti-ring ticket. "I saw Manuel Gonzales there but not Fred Delgado. I saw Gonzales talking to the voters. He was up to the ropes quite often talking to the voters. He was 30 feet from the door where the voters went in.

"Says He Refused to Buy Votes. "I heard Elias Calderon say to like: 'Well, like, how much will you offer for my vote?' He said: 'I haven't any money to pay for votes.' Calderon answered: 'I can buy \$15 from the other side.' He said: 'Well, go where you can get money. I haven't any money to pay for votes.' "I had some trouble. A man told me that Montoya had a man to whip me, and he would pay his fine.

"Cross Examined. "On cross examination the witness said: 'Anyone could come up to the ropes. I think I am an anti-ring man. The threats did not have any effect on me. I took notice of the threats, but more so when they came from an officer. "Certainly I worked for the anti-ring. I am still working for it. "Falvey—"I can see that."

"Witness—"I did not go as close to the ropes as Montoya. I was 60 feet from the rope. Alderete was about the same distance. I was not paid. "C. W. Marshall—"Did the officers permit others to come as close to the ropes as they?" "A—"I don't know; there were a good many people around there."

"On redirect examination the witness testified: 'While I was not working, I was there to see what was doing might occur there. The men that Montoya and Gonzales were talking to were men standing in line because there were a lot of pistols around their hands or in their pockets. Montoya and Gonzales had pistols. "You were not afraid of pistols, were you—you see them every day on the streets, don't you?" "Witness—"But they aren't as brave as they are on election day. I could see by the men's eyes that they meant business. Their eyes looked like they were afraid. They didn't say anything to me. "Falvey—"Their eyes looked like spy glasses, and you stayed away?" "Witness—"They looked supreme."

"Guns, But No Trouble. "Thurmond—"Did those anti-party people saw around there make any display of the fact that they had arms?" "Witness—"One put his hand on his gun. I did not see any trouble around there."

I saw Montoya and Gonzales there. They were armed. They were there all day. "The witness stated that he saw Gonzales and another throw a drunken Mexican into the polls. "Witness—"I saw Montoya and Gonzales talking to the voters frequently. I saw them motion to those in the line to close up. I did not see any others there. "As the people went there to vote they told them, and talked to them. They were there all the time that morning watching them. In the afternoon I saw Montoya, Gonzales and Giraldo there talking to the voters. They were going in. They were quite a distance from the rope in the afternoon as their seats had been called in the morning that they were too near the rope. I called the attention of the policeman to it and he said: 'I was at 5:45 o'clock that morning. Their position changed as soon as the policeman talked to them. They did not retire as much as 100 feet from where the election was being held. "I was about 15 or 20 yards from the other side of the door from the door of the voting place. "Montoya and Gonzales were nearer the voters than I was. They were talking to the voters by their movements. I heard the sound of their voices, but could not tell what they were saying. "The witness stated that he did not know anything about the anti-ring ticket. He did not know whether he was a citizen of this country or not. He said that he saw policemen in the voting place but there was no disturbance at the polls. "Heard Calderon Make Offer. "Witness—"I heard Calderon make an offer for my vote. He said: 'I will vote for you if you pay me more I will vote for you.' "Says Calderon Voted for Ring. "After this conversation I saw Calderon go into the polling place at No. 2. Calderon told me that he had voted for the ring, that he had paid him \$15. He did not tell me what he had paid him for. "I only know of the one vote that was paid for, because Calderon told me so."

"On cross examination the witness stated: 'Calderon told me that if he would pay him \$20 he would vote for him. "The witness said that after the policeman had spoken to Montoya and Gonzales, they did not know where they only made the one complaint. He stated that Calderon had voted in precinct No. 2. He said that he did not know if he had voted for the ring or not. "The witness stated that he saw Calderon go into the polls but did not know if he voted. "The witness stated that Marcus was the name of the drunken man who was thrown into the polls. He did not remember his other name. He said he did not hear any conversation between Calderon and Montoya. "The committee adjourned until 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. "Tells of Marking Ballots. "Julio Graman, first witness called Monday afternoon, said that he was an associate judge of precinct No. 2, and Joe Dunn assisted him. "Over 100 illiterate voters voted at the polls," the witness said. "Joe Dunn assisted them in marking the ballots. I assisted them. I should judge I assisted 20. Jim Mason, clerk, assisted. No one else assisted in marking the ballots. Only when there was a man who did not know how to mark the ballots. Some Mexicans came up to me and wanted me to mark their tickets. Two applied to me. I did not mark them. Dunn objected. He said: 'I am the judge and will mark the ballots.' After dinner when the men had finished some ballots. I suppose he let me do this to save further argument. "These were the ballots on that day; we marked some of the ballots on that day. "There were no supervisors there. One came to be sworn in as a supervisor. His name was John W. Breyer, a policeman. I don't know his first name. He came out there with Ed Breyer. "I know that Joe Dunn was a ring man. I know that by questions that were asked the voters. "Joe Dunn refused to let the supervisor serve. The anti-ring did not want to let the supervisor serve. There were none appointed. When I asked for a supervisor in the morning, Joe Dunn wanted to swear in a city employee as supervisor. "While Dunn was marking the ticket there was no one there. He has those papers yet I think. "I have a list of those I swore in. I can't recall the names of the others. When I objected in the morning to Dunn swearing in the city employee he did not want to vote. "I did not have a supervisor up to noon. Joe Dunn said he did not have any authority to swear in Johnson. "So far as I know, Johnson did not present credentials. "A—"When Dunn first refused to swear him in, I did not know what got credentials. I do not know just what they were. "Says He Warned Dunn. "Witness—"I marked a good many many tickets. So far as I know the only thing was, when a man came in there with a ticket from precinct No. 15. He marked the ticket on the billiard table. I told Dunn not to mark that ticket because he was not entitled to vote there. "I did not want to get in trouble. I was the only one there. "Dunn never objected to my going along with him. I did not object to having him go with me either. As far as I can say under oath, Dunn marked



Theatrical Stage Employes. 13. Painters and Decorators' union. 14. Brewery Workers' union. 15. Plasterers' union. 16. Cigarmakers' union. 17. Boilermakers' union. 18. Machinists' union. 19. Blacksmiths' union. 20. Horsehoes' union. The grand marshal will divide the organizations and place the Fort Bliss band at the head of the second division. The floats will constitute the third division. All arrangements will be completed at next Monday night's meeting in Union Labor hall. The railroad brotherhoods have been invited to turn out.
