**LONE BANDIT BINDS
SIX MAIL CAR CLERKS**

Rifles Car of Mail and Is Shot With His Own Pistol.

Topeka, Kan., Aug. 23.—A robber who boarded Union Pacific train No. 101 at Kansas City last night, bound and gagged six mail clerks and rifled all the first class mail, was captured when the train pulled into Topeka and shot by his own revolver in the scuffle over his arrest.

Word of the holdup was wired ahead and police officers and Union Pacific officials met the train here. Patrolman Sanders pulled back the curtains of the berth in which the robber was lying and flashed his lantern on him. He saw a revolver in the man's hand and grasped it. The weapon was discharged and the bullet entered the bandit's breast. A letter was found in the bandit's clothes addressed to "Mrs. Willis Lonsberry, Medford Ore., R. D. No. 2."

The robber was taken to a local hospital, supposedly in a dying condition. All the stolen mail was found in his grip.

The train which he boarded was the westbound St. Louis-Colorado limited, which left Kansas City at 10:15 p. m. The robber in order to cover his crime forced one of the mail clerks to handle the local mail at Bonner Springs, 17 miles west of Kansas City.

At St. Francis hospital the man confessed to the authorities today that his name is Willis Lonsberry, formerly of Medford Ore., that he is an ex-railway mail clerk, that he has a wife and two children in Medford.

The man is about 40 years old. He is about five feet eight inches tall, and weighs about 140 pounds. He is bald and smooth shaven, with light complexion.

He carried a flashlight and a gun, and wore leggings. He was dressed in overalls and a jacket when pilfering the mail car. When arrested he was dressed only in his underclothing.

The robber was still alive at a hospital here this morning, but the police had not yet learned his identity. Hospital attendants said he was able to talk and the railroad officials hoped soon to induce him to divulge his name and other information regarding himself.

A holdup, stranger robbery on a train never has been recorded in the history of the Union Pacific, which has been the victim of many holdups, local officials of the company said today.

The train known as the "Denver Express" carrying heavy mail, was just leaving Kansas City when a man, slender and about 40 years of age, ran across the station platform and leaped into the mail car through the open door. J. D. Withers, the clerk in charge, turned and faced the man who leveled a revolver at him. Withers was commanded to bind

and gag his five associates and not to raise a hand if he cared for his life. Withers obeyed the command and bound and gagged all his fellow workers, E. D. Smalley, Joseph Gaines, C. H. Stewart, F. R. Oldham and Robert Hartsfall.

At Bonner Springs, where the train made a brief stop, the robber commanded the men to work the mail so as not to attract attention of persons at the station. When Lawrence was reached, the robber dropped quickly from the car and ran toward the rear of the train. Withers quickly gave the alarm to the train crew. A negro porter said he saw a man with bulging pockets enter a sleeping car.

The robber talked about the crime today. He insisted that he shot himself purposefully when cornered.

"I am sorry I did not kill myself," he said.

The man, who is well educated, went on calmly:

"When a man is up against it, it is worse than people can possibly know."

He told why he climbed back into the train he had robbed.

"I thought that the Pullman of that train would be the last place they would look for me."

He refused to give his identity.

"I will protect my folks," he said.

Today the police found another letter in the man's clothing that may clear his identity. It was addressed to Denver. The letter was turned over to the postal authorities who so far have not divulged its contents.

GENERAL BOOTH'S BODY IS LYING IN STATE

Portrait of Mrs. Booth Displayed at Side of Coffin—Flags of All Nations Adorn the Walls.

London, England, Aug. 23.—Gen. Booth's body was removed last night from the evangelist's late residence, at Hadleywood, to Congress Hall, Clapton, in the northeast of London, where it will lie in state until Saturday night.

At the side of the coffin, a portrait of Mrs. Booth is displayed. Flags of all nations adorn the walls of the hall.

Throughout the day a stream of callers passed into the late general's modest residence at Hadleywood.

In connection with the funeral there is under consideration a suggestion that the coffin be conveyed to Abner Park cemetery on a gun carriage.

WANTS GRADE CHANGE TO AVERT FLOOD WATER

Dan Stedham says he has a kick coming against the city, the Southwestern railroad and the weather man. Dan had just bought two tons of first grade alfalfa hay and had stored it in his back yard when the rain came along Thursday afternoon and converted his back yard into a duck pond and the baled hay into islands in the pond. Stedham lives at 2917 Bliss street, at the mouth of the arroyo which the Southwestern railroad bridged just back of Dan's house, which causes it to pour a flood of water into his back yard every time it rains. Mr. Stedham is preparing a petition to the city council to have the grade changed so that water will be carried away from his house instead of into his barn lot.

EYES OF MURDERER MAY BE GRAFTED ON BLIND MAN

Denver, Colo., Aug. 23.—If the strange request of William J. Abrams, a blind man of Denver, is granted by the state authorities and consent to one of the most remarkable operations known to medical science is given by Lewis J. Wechter, condemned to die in the state penitentiary at Canyon City next week, Abrams will look through the eyes of a murderer the rest of his life, provided the proposed operation is successful. If Abrams' request is granted Dr. Foster and two other surgeons will be in the death chamber when the trap is sprung. Immediately after Wechter has been officially pronounced dead the eyes will be removed before the removal of the body from the death chamber. They will be placed in a saline solution, after which the surgeons will rush to a hospital nearby where Abrams will be in readiness when the cornea from Wechter's eyes will be grafted onto the sightless eyes of Abrams.

LAMB BUCK TO BE SENT FROM EL PASO TO SCOTLAND

An El Paso county lamb buck is due for a long ride soon. Dr. A. C. Young, who has established the karakule sheep ranch near Belen, Tex., has received an order from Edinburgh university, of Scotland, for a young lamb buck to be sent to the university experimental farm at Edinburgh. The lamb will be shipped from El Paso as soon as it can be crated and will be sent on one of the fast trans-Atlantic liners to its new home in Scotland.

**TURKS DESTROY
CHRISTIAN VILLAGES**

London, England, Aug. 23.—The destruction of Christian villages near Berat, northern Albania, continues, telegraphs the correspondent of the Times at Andrievitza, Montenegro. Eleven villages now have been burned. Great acts of barbarity have been committed by Turkish soldiers. No Moslem villages have been burned.

**MONGOLIAN TROOPS
ARE LOOTING TAONAN**

Pekin, China, Aug. 23.—A force of 2000 Mongolian troops has occupied the city of Taonan, Manchuria, and has begun looting houses and stores, according to a Chinese report received here.

The Mongolians are said to be commanded by a lieutenant of the shah of Mongolia.

Detachments of Chinese troops from Mukden with a number of Manchus guns attacked them during the night of August 20 and fighting was still proceeding on the 21st. The result has not yet been learned.

**YUAN SHI KAI'S ADVISER
SAYS REPUBLIC IS STABLE**

London, England, Aug. 23.—Dr. George E. Emerson, whose appointment as adviser to president Yuan Shi Kai recently was announced and who is now in London, in a letter to the Times protests against the gloomy and pessimistic views of the English newspapers concerning China.

He regards the execution of several Hankow generals at Pekin as unimportant. He says the men were condemned on unimpeachable evidence.

Dr. Emerson says that when he left China on August 6 affairs everywhere were improving, and he gives numerous reasons for his belief in the stability of the Chinese republic.
