BANK CLEARINGS AND RAILROAD EARNINGS SHOW GAIN New York, N. Y., Sept. 7.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade today says:

Bank clearings in August gained 4.6 percent over last year, while during this week they increased 10.5 percent over 1911 and 1.6 percent over 1910. The evidence of these earnings, as confirmed by the current railroad gross earnings, which show a gain of 6.8 percent over 1911.

The remarkable consumption of iron and copper products continues to the point of actual capacity and all the principal industries show satisfactory activity.

Buying Is Small in Volume, but Prices Close Above the Average.

New York, N. Y., Sept. 7.—Irregularity was reflected in the opening dealings on the stock exchange today. Many of the active issues were lower, however, with weakness greatest in Canadian Pacific, Louisville & Nashville and Steel. Union Pacific, which at first showed small gain, soon fell under yesterday's close. Speculation came to a standstill in active stocks as soon as business began, but there was a lively movement both ways in certain ordinarily inactive specialties.
