POLICE DO NOT GIVE PAROLED MEN A CHANCE Chicago, Ill., Sept. 25.—Thomas J. Tynan, warden of the Colorado state prison, in an address before the members of the United States Commission on Commerce, declared that police and sheriffs persecute paroled convicts and do not give the former prisoners a honest chance to reform.

"Any one directly acquainted with the methods of the police and sheriffs know how they regard the poor fellow who has served a term in the penitentiary," said the warden.

"This recent attitude against him, and the moment anything happens the paroled convict is seized if he is found within a mile of the scene of a crime."

"I have had more trouble between convicts paroled from our Colorado institution and the police than the poor prisoner ever gives society. They don't give the unfortunate fellow the proper change and a better system must be devised."

Warden Tynan also denounced flogging and said it made men more unkindly and instilled them with bitterness.

HOME NEAR ELGIN DESTROYED BY FIRE

Schools in Elgin District Open Tax Increase Puts Santa Cruz County in Second Place.

Elgin, Ariz., Sept. 26.—The house and nearly all of its contents of M. L. Mowry, east of Elgin, was destroyed by fire. The loss was about \$500 with no insurance.

The fire originated in the hen house, where hot ashes had been taken. Mr. Mowry sustained painful burns about the arms and hands trying to save her household effects.

SIX POWER GROUP ENDEAVORS TO ARRANGE FOR FOMA CHINA

Washington, D. C., Sept. 25.—An official statement of the state department denied that efforts to place an international loan in China through the six power group had been abandoned.

The American bankers represented in the six power group of bankers which offered to finance the Chinese government reorganization—J. P. Morgan & Co., Kuhn, Loeb & Co., and the First National bank, and National City bank, of New York—issued a statement regarding their attitude to secure the loan.

"The conditions upon which the group were prepared to make the loan were submitted to the Chinese government, the statement says, and were declined by it, not because of the financial terms, but because of the political conditions."

"After the most careful consideration of conditions in China and the difficulties of the Chinese government, these requirements were deemed essential."

DONA ANA HAS THE GOOD ROADS "BUG"

Claim is Made That Roads Are Now in Good Shape From El Paso—Bonds to Be Issued for Road Work.

Las Cruces, N. M., Sept. 25.—Good roads enthusiasm seems to be rampant in Dona Ana county. It is taking definite shape through the medium of the new county road board, just appointed by the state highway commission.

The new road laws passed by the last legislature. The road board consists of Francis E. Lester, W. S. Gilliam and E. K. McNeil.

Under another one of the new road laws, Dona Ana county is planning to issue good roads bonds this winter in the sum of \$100,000, to be expended upon a comprehensive system of good roads for the county.

Additional to this, other counties in the state will nearly double this sum, an available fund for the building of good roads within the next 12 months.

The necessary petitions required by law have already been signed by the citizens in all parts of the county, and the board of county commissioners at their meeting to be held within the next few days will call for the necessary election to pass upon the bonds.

Dona Ana has raised within the past week the sum of \$4000 for building the new road from Las Cruces to Organ, all of which has been received.

The Camino Real between Las Cruces and the El Paso-Anthony paved road has also been greatly improved in the past few days.

Damage resulting from rains had been repaired. For two miles south of Mesilla Park the road is in magnificent condition, a large part of it paved.

The trip to Las Cruces can be made easily by auto in two hours at the present time, it is said, the distance being 42 miles.

The road has been greatly improved within the last few days for the benefit of traffic coming from the lower part of the county and from El Paso to attend the Mesilla Valley fair.

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FARMING FARMER TAKES A GOOD RECORD

Realizes \$2622.50 on 23 Acres of Alfalfa; Try Threshing Alfalfa at Balmorhea.

Balmorhea, Texas, Sept. 25.—S. W. Vanderen, living one mile north of Balmorhea, has a neat record in alfalfa. He has 23 acres of alfalfa this season, five acres of which were not a very good stand.

He is now watering his land for the fourth crop. This has been an unusually dry year and is also the first year the farmers have threshed their alfalfa. They will know more about preparing for threshing next year, as the alfalfa should be watered more in the winter to raise seed.

Mr. Vanderen has a very good alfalfa stand at a depth of 30 feet stands 20 feet in water and tests out about 45 gallons per minute. He is trying to develop alfalfa water to irrigate the entire farm of 150 acres.

Mr. Vanderen has only been on this farm about 2 1/2 years, when he purchased it, there were no improvements on it except a small two story house. Now he has a large two story residence, well surrounded by well kept lawns and large shade trees.
