CARNEGIE WILL PENSION ALL PRESIDENTS AND THEIR WIDOWS.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 22.—Future presidents of the United States will be provided for by a pension of \$25,000 per annum, by the Carnegie Corporation of New York. The grant is provided for with the idea of enabling former executives of the nation to devote their unique knowledge gained in public affairs to the public good, free from pecuniary care. A similar amount is to be paid widows of presidents as long as they remain unmarried.

The pension is to be promptly offered to the presidents or their widows so that no application will be required from them.


