VELVA NUT ICE CREAM 3-4 cupful Red Velva Syrup, 2 cupfuls scalded milk, 1 tablespoonful flour, 1-4 cupful sugar, 1 egg, pinch of salt, 2 quart cream, 1 cupful chopped English walnuts, 1 teaspoonful almond extract, 1 teaspoonful rose extract. Beat up the egg with the flour and sugar, and gradually add the milk. Cook for 20 minutes in a double boiler, stirring constantly. Cool and add the syrup, salt, nuts, cream and the extracts, and freeze. Serve in dainty dishes with a preserved cherry on top of each.
