# SHATTUCK WORKS

### 225 MEN IN MINE

Continues Shipment of Lead Ores to El Paso; Warren District Charted.

Bisbee, Ariz., Feb. 8.—Development work at the Shattuck is being pushed with gratifying results. The development work is on the 300, 400, 500 and 600 foot levels. There are 225 men employed at the mine, of which 190 are under ground. The company is keeping up its average shipments of 250 tons a day to the Copper King smelter at Douglas, and is only awaiting the completion of the smelter to nearly double its shipments.

Shipments of lead to the El Paso smelter continue. This ore is running about 40 percent copper, three percent silver and nearly 30 percent gold and silver values. On the 300 foot level ore has been cut for a distance of 500 feet nearly to the surface very high in value, amounting to 30 percent in copper and 25 in gold and silver values. Good results have also been obtained in the development of the lead claim, this being practically untouched territory.

**Sinking New Shaft.**  
Good reports are made by the Copper Queen. The sinking of the new shaft near Don Louis, which is to be known as the Wade Hampton, is progressing favorably, although it is not yet at a sufficient depth to accurately determine the quality of ore. A drift is being put in at the 200 foot level of the Silver Bear, and prophetic development at the Copper King with satisfactory results. Construction work is also being pushed by the company.

The foundation is being laid for the new hoist at the mine, and work is well under way on the new change house at the Southwest. Considerable excavation work had to be done at this point. The production is being kept up by the Queen and it is expected that an increase will be shown in the February figures.

**Charting the District.**  
The mining committee of the Commercial club is now at work on a complete chart showing all the claims of the Warren district.

Berry Baxter, president of the Princeton Copper company, located near here in the Huachuca mountains, is in the city on his way to San Francisco. While here he has made a trip to the property and reports that work is progressing favorably. Twenty-five men are employed at the mine, and no shipments are now being made.

**Concerning the Junction Shaft.**  
Work on the concreting of the Junction shaft of the Calumet & Arizona is now well under way. The shaft is destined to become one of the most important of the whole Calumet & Arizona property, as it has a great lateral area still to go into. From the shaft it has several thousand feet to go before it touches the property of the Denn-Arizona in that direction, and it is figured that a great deal of good ore will be discovered, as the miners cut through the rocks in this field.

**Enough has already been done in diamond drilling to demonstrate that this big tract is well mineralized. Besides this, running down the valley towards Don Louis is another big body of ore that is being proved by the Junction and Briggs shafts. The miners are now pouring into these comparatively new fields the big ore and good success is reported. The ore is giving good results in the company's smelter at Douglas. All the big ore development is above the 1000 foot level and above this point towards the surface there is anywhere from 700 to 800 feet of ground holding copper ore oxides and sulphides, carrying excellent values in gold and silver, besides copper.**

# TO OPERATE BUENA TIERRA PROPERTY

Exploration Company Arranges for Extensive Work in Mine in Santa Eulalia District.

Chihuahua, Mex., Feb. 8.—The Exploration company has floated a subsidiary, the Buena Tierra Mining company, for the purpose of operating the mine of that name in the Santa Eulalia district. The mine had for some time been a producer, under local ownership, of argentiferous lead carbonate, contained in limestone, and is on the same group of lodes as the Potosi, Santo Domingo, Velardeña and Mina Vieja, mines which have been profitably productive. The ore also contains a large proportion of iron.

During the 18 months that the mine has been worked by Exploration company, 47,324 tons of ore were shipped to the smelter at Chihuahua, and the price received was \$7.71 per ton. The cost per ton of ore delivered at the smelter was \$2.89, leaving a working profit of \$4.82. The results would have been more favorable, if it had not been for irregularity in the operations of the smelter.

The average content of recent shipments was 12 ounces silver and 10 percent lead. It is expected that the sulphide zone will be reached at 150 to 200 feet below the present level. Complete statements of the position are given by R. T. Szallies, R. M. Raymond and A. C. Brinker. They estimate the reserve at 250,000 tons, averaging \$7.50 per ton, giving a profit of \$4.60 per ton, and the monthly output will be 4,000 tons. The yearly profit is therefore figured at \$14,900 for five years, the life of the present reserve. The cost of the purchase of the mine is \$120,000. Of this, \$300,000 in cash or shares is the purchase price paid to the Exploration company, which had devoted the \$167,000 to the purchase, development and equipment of the mine. In the present issue, it is intended to devote \$20,000 each at working capital.

The Buena Tierra was formerly owned by C. O'Callahan, of this city, who sold it to its present owners several years ago for the sum of \$90,000 pesos.

## RENEWED ACTIVITY IN ARTESIA FIELD

Dayton Company Secures Additional Oil Land; Pecos Valley Company

Artesia, N. M., Feb. 8.—This month promises considerable development in the oil field south of Artesia. The Dayton Petroleum company, of which C. R. Troxell is president, has succeeded in securing leases from Pete, Jake and William Kissinger on about 400 acres of land near the tract on which the Brown well is located. The company, according to the terms of the leases, agrees to start drilling this month, two wells on the Kissinger farms.

The Pecos Valley Oil and Gas company has decided to resume drilling and is moving its derrick and machinery from the Martin farm to the Spencer farm, about one-fourth mile south of the Brown well. The company is still pumping about 20 barrels of oil a day from the Brown well, which it is retailing at \$3.50 a barrel. The company has a contract to deliver over 40 barrels of oil daily to various concerns in Artesia.

The Seven Rivers Oil and Gas company is down on 500 tons in its well operations. In order to accelerate operations a night crew has been added, as the company hopes to be the first in the district to strike flowing oil. The company recently disposed of a number of its leases to some El Paso capitalists, who propose capitalizing and developing the oil district.

## ARIZONA RATES ON ORES ARE REDUCED

Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 8.—Reduced rates on ores will shortly become effective from all points on the Southern Pacific, Arizona Eastern and El Paso & Southwestern to the Copper Queen and Calumet & Arizona smelters at Douglas. The reductions are particularly great on live granite ores.

For years the small claim owners in southern Arizona have complained that high freight rates made it impossible for them to ship their ores at a profit. Recently the Arizona corporation commission took the matter up with the railroad officials and secured important reductions without the issuance of a formal order.

Some of the reductions are as follows:

- Yuma county—Yuma and Dome, \$4 to \$7.50; Wilton and Mal Paso, \$3.35 to \$2.25; Ariz and Sentinel, \$2.35 to \$2.
- Pinal county—Florence, \$4 to \$3.50; Casa Grande and Red Rock, \$2.15 to \$2; Superior, \$2.15 to \$2.
- Maricopa county—Gila, \$3.35 to \$2.75. (The Phoenix rate remains at \$3.50 and \$4.00, the rate is published from Hassajampa.)
- Pima county—Tucson, Vall and Wantana, \$1.35; Sahuarita, Amado and Silver, \$2.25 to \$2.
- Santa Cruz county—Bohston, \$3 to \$1.50; Patagonia, \$2 to \$1.50; Nogales, \$2.15 to \$2.
- Cochise county—Huachuca, \$2 to \$1.50; Benson and Fairbank, \$1 to \$1.25; Cochise, \$1.50 to \$1.25; Simon, \$1.75 to \$1.50.
- Gila county—Winkelman and Hayden, \$4 to \$2.75.
