

RECLAMATION LAW WANTED BY ARIZONA

Proposed Law Provides For Issuance by State of \$20,000,000 in Bonds.

LANDOWNERS TO BOND LAND TO THE STATE

PHOENIX, ARIZ., Feb. 12.—Senator C. H. Wood will introduce this afternoon a bill creating a state reclamation department and providing a bond issue of \$20,000,000.

Five Percent On Bonds

The bill provides for the issuance of \$20,000,000 worth of bonds by the funding and loan commission. They shall not bear interest of more than 5 percent per annum, or be sold for less than par.

Land Owners Issue Bonds

The reclamation commissioners shall examine each project for which aid is desired. If it is approved, the land owners shall form an association and issue bonds. The bonds shall be taken up by the state at par, out of the reclamation fund, and held till they are worth par in the open market.

Provisions of the Bill

The following extract from the title gives an idea of the provisions: "Authorizing the state to take title to unpatented lands in irrigation and drainage districts and providing for the disposal of such lands. Providing

for the acquisition of arid lands for reclamation. Providing for a maximum unit. Providing for the extermination of noxious grasses, weeds and other growth injurious to crops. Providing for the exclusion of foreign labor from irrigation projects and the use of convict labor thereon.

No Morning Sessions

In both the house and the senate the report of the code committees from the two bodies was adopted, and there will be no more morning sessions. In the house the report was adopted without opposition, but there was a fight in the senate over whether his body should be called in order in the forenoon. It was finally decided to have a roll call each morning at 9:30, then adjourn till one o'clock.

Yuma Bridge Bill Passes

Kerr's Yuma bridge bill got through the house yesterday. Not a vote was registered against it. Tuesday morning the house received Wessel's Yuma bridge bill making exactly the same provision as Kerr's. In all probability the Wessel bill is the one that will go to the governor for his signature.

Propose New Office

Two bills were introduced by the committee on state institutions. No. 21 is to direct the transfer of money temporarily from the general fund to the inheritance tax fund to be transferred back later. The other is for the employment of a deputy state treasurer, at a salary of \$100 a month, to take care of the extra work imposed on the treasurer's office by the operations of the inheritance tax law.

Registration for Women

The committee on suffrage and election recommended the passage of H. H. Kane's house bill No. 26, which requires county supervisors to inspect all roads under their supervision at least twice a year. Failure to fulfill this duty constitutes cause for removal.

Punch on Bradner Not Made

Ever since the legislature convened in special session there have been whispers that a resolution to unseat Sam B. Bradner, on the ground that he did not accept the position of secretary of the state livestock sanitary board, would be introduced. It is known that such a resolution has been drawn. Several of Bradner's enemies have scrutinized it carefully, not one has introduced it before the house.

Wesley's Resignation

Wesley resigned from the judicial committee. He is one of the house sub-committee on code revision and stated that he would not have time to devote to the work of the judiciary committee.

Anti-Tipping Measure

Efforts to put off the meetings of the senate until afternoon were defeated and it will meet daily at 9:30. Senator W. W. Pace introduced his anti-tipping measure. It prohibits the offering or receiving of gratuities in hotels, barber shops, railroad cars or anywhere else that tipping is customary.

Ask Funds For Bridges

The committee on memorials recommended the passage of memorials Nos. 4 and 5, which are addressed to congress and the California legislature, asking an appropriation of \$25,000 from each for the Yuma bridge. The report was favorable.

Want New Fence Law

Legislation affecting the cattle industry of the state is being watched with the keenest interest by the cattle growers, who have several laws that they want to see passed. A legislative committee of about 20 members was appointed by the Arizona Cattle Growers' association at the last annual meeting. The members of this committee have decided that a four-wire fence should be legal. Already they have held one conference with the livestock committee of the house and senate, and a new fence bill will be introduced.

AMERICANS FLEE FROM MEXICO

Newspapers From Mexican Capital Show That Conditions Are Very Desperate.

Laredo, Tex., Feb. 12.—Today's train from Mexico City brought many men, women and children—refugees, who left Monday, soon after the Diaz revolt began. Few passengers could give a coherent story of the fighting. They deemed it wise to leave the capital notwithstanding no anti-foreign demonstrations had occurred. They reported no disorders along the line of the Mexican National from Mexico City to Laredo, but said excitement was in evidence at all points.
