Mrs. Frank Spence is entertaining the Degree of Honor lodge this afternoon at her home 301 Montana street.

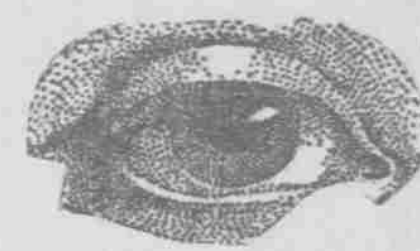

**"WHITE SLAVE" VICTIMS TAKE INTEREST IN REFORM WORK.**  
Washington, D. C., Feb. 25.—Stanley W. Finch, special commissioner of the department of justice for the suppression of white slave traffic, outlining the plans of the National Welfare association, declared that a successful campaign for the suppression of the evil, must include general education of the people, enforcement of the law and reform work among the victims themselves.

Mr. Finch declared that in every white slave case investigated by the department, victims have expressed the desire to reform. To accomplish this reform it is the purpose of the association to interest the victims in the association and to employ them in its work.

The association, now working in 200 cities, plans to extend its work to 500 as soon as possible.



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**\$12,000 A YEAR NOT ENOUGH FOR 14 YEAR OLD GIRL.**  
New York, N. Y., Feb. 25.—Twelve thousand dollars a year is insufficient for 14 year old Helen A. Dewitt of this city, according to a referee who considered her guardian's demand for an increase. The referee recommended that the child receive \$12,000 annually. She is a daughter of the late Percival Dewitt, from whom she inherited \$200,000, eight years after inheriting \$1,000,000 upon her mother's death.

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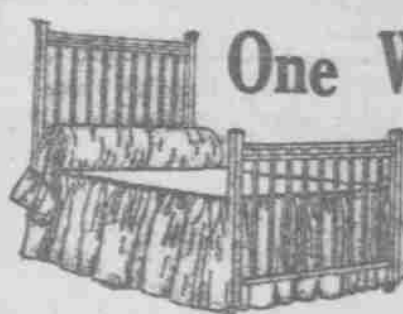
