NEW YORK BURGLARS GET \$300,000 IN GEMS

Crackmen Avoid Burglar Alarm and Enter Vault of Pausanias Containing \$300,000 in Valuables. New York, March 17.—Fifty detectives were at work today trying to run down the crackmen who robbed Martin Simon & Sons' pawnshop on the east side, some time yesterday of \$300,000 worth of jewelry.

They were rewarded by such riches that the robbers must have been stumped. The vault contained valuables worth \$500,000, according to Simons, in jewels, watches, diamonds, pearls, and \$200,000 in cash and checks.
