SALAZAR MAY GO TO MEXICO CITY

Juarez Officials Know Nothing of His Coming to Mexico City

If Inez Salazar is coming to Juarez he has not so advised the authorities in Juarez. They know that he is in Casas Grandes and admit the probability of his coming to the border town, but also say it is possible that he may go to Chihuahua, and then to Mexico City. He is in accord with the Huerta government, the Juarez officials say, and they express confidence in his ability to pacify his followers and restore peace in Chihuahua.

Andres Salazar, who was chief of police in Juarez when Salazar and Camp took Juarez from the Maderistas one year ago this month, is again siding with that position.

Everardo Rodriguez is postmaster of Juarez and his department is now handling through mail from Juarez to Mexico City, over the Mexican Central line.

The first building improvement in Juarez since the fall of the Porfirio Diaz regime is being made on Comercio street. It is a \$400,000 store building to be used as a moving picture theater and saloon. It is located just east of No. 1000 street, which borders on the east side of the plaza. Narciso Cruz is the owner and builder of the new structure.

Young women of Juarez are preparing to give a benefit theatrical performance for the Red Cross. The drama will be enacted by young men and women of Juarez society.

GROWING WEATHER DECLINES WHEAT

Selling Pressure Is Directed Against Hogs—Provisions Advance.

Chicago, Ill., March 25.—Excellent growing weather in the winter crop belt sent wheat down today. The favorable conditions at home more than offset a higher market in Liverpool. Prices opened a shade lower to 3/4 to 1/2 higher with May a shade to 3/4 higher at 90% to 90 1/2 to 90 3/4. That option declined later to 89 1/2. May corn began a shade to 1/2 higher at 52 1/2 to 53 1/2, touched 52 3/4, 5 1/2, and then went down to 52 1/2. May oats started a shade lower to a shade higher, at 33 1/2 to 33 3/4, and declined to 33 1/2.

Provisions advanced on account of light hog receipts. Pork however was under much selling pressure. The opening prices were 15c to 15c lower to 2 1/2 to 5c higher, with May figures as follows: Pork, \$20.75; lard, \$11.75 to \$11.20; and ribs, \$11.25.
