Bartlett, deputy. These messages, while resenting any reflection made on the character and integrity of senator Hudspeth, do not endorse the congressional bill.

certainty that this will be done. In fact, the indications are that the governor will let the lawmakers go home and recall the session when it is not to pass the general appropriation bill and other matters he may submit, probably some of the platform demands. Governor Silent On Extra Session. "How about a special session, governor?" "I shall discuss that when the present session adjourns," replied the chief executive. This was all that could be obtained from the governor on the subject. Probably the governor wants to give the lawmakers a final chance to do something during the present week before he reaches conclusion. An excellent reason has been advanced as to why the governor will not call a special session. It is an ordinary session, and that is, by that time the people will have voted on the proposed constitutional amendment for the University of Texas and Agricultural and Mechanical college, also to authorize the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas and Agricultural and Mechanical college, also for permanent improvements. This amendment is to be voted on during the middle of next July, and if adopted, immediate legislation would be necessary to carry these constitutional amendments into effect. A special session at that time would be just in time to enact laws on these subjects.

Among the measures destined to become laws before the expiration of the present session, may be mentioned the Collins currency compensation act, and the Terrell-Darwin senate bill creating a state highway commission. Both of these measures were passed finally in the senate and are now up for final passage in the house. They have passed by a narrow margin and now only need to be called up in order to be passed finally. The highway commission bill provides for the creation of a state highway commission and the office of state highway engineer at a salary of \$4000 a year. This bill is being considered in the quarters at Austin and will advise and cooperate with the various counties in the state on the question of the construction of highways.

Alamo Property Control. It is now apparent that the legislature will make no effort to repeal the Alamo property control act. The free commission to which the house and senate bills were referred, has concluded that it cannot reach an agreement.

Fire Insurance Measure. There will be an attempt made at the present session of the legislature to repeal the Robertson insurance law. Senator Gibson, chairman of the committee on this subject, announces that he will not push his bill.

Jim Hoag County. The house has tonight introduced to re-enactment the bill creating Jim Hoag county out of Brooks county. Although not an important measure considered by the present legislature, this bill, probably has been the center of the bitter fight of the legislature. Feels that the bill is a violation of the constitution and against the bill has been high. The bill proposes the creation of the new county out of Brooks county, and the division of land from Duval county. Brooks county was created by the last legislature two years ago. Those who are in favor of the bill are those who declare that they are without representation, inasmuch as their total number of voters is too small to elect a representative to the legislature. There are less than half a hundred voters in the western part of Brooks county. If the bill passes, Hebronville will be part of the new county. A number of wealthy ranchmen are in favor of the bill, and the fight has been bitter on both sides.

BURGES FIGHTING HUDSPETH MEASURE Refuses to Sanction 700-Mile El Paso District—Barges is Cautious. Besides the official announcement that James Bryce had declined the ambassadorship to Great Britain, there was today a report that the senator had declined the ambassadorship to the United States. It is probable that Bryce would not discuss the matter.

Wilson Confers With Bryce. One of the best jobs at the disposal of the Wilson administration has been the position of chief forester, which pays \$5000. The position is held by Prof. Henry S. Graves, who succeeded Gifford Pinchot. Under new conditions, the position will become vacant only in the event of the resignation of Mr. Graves or his removal for failure to carry out the duties of his office.

The problem of providing civil service examinations for the thousands of foresters who are to be employed by the classified service by executive order, was taken up at a conference of the forestry department and the civil service commission last night at the banquet tendered them by the Commercial club a number of prominent officials of the G. NEW PLAN TESTED IN RIVER AT VADO. Iowa Man's Scheme for Protecting River Bank's Proposed to Prevent Damage in Spring. Berlin, N. M., March 25.—W. H. Dean, of Sioux City, Iowa, visited this district today to discuss with the engineers and state engineers, relative to installing bank protectors and current deflectors. Mr. Dean has used these protectors and deflectors on the Missouri river with great success. It is said that at any place where the river is cutting a bank, one of these deflectors can be put into use in a very short time and the current diverted to a safe place. The deflectors are constructed of two inch planks and are triangular in shape, the sides being 20 feet long and from 10 to 15 feet in height. They float in the water and are anchored with two anchors made by filling a wooden barrel with concrete and using strong cable, the anchor being thrown right into the river. Position of the deflectors can be changed by raising the cable and attaching a new anchor.

One of these has been constructed and placed in position on mile south of Vado and has proved satisfactory, although now the river is at a low stage and it is difficult to forecast the work during high water. This will be watched very carefully and if a success, will make a great improvement over the method now in use. By using these there should be no trouble in keeping the river from cutting around the bridge.
