PHYSICAL TRAINING DEMONSTRATION OF THE Y. W. C. A. IS MUCH ENJOYED

A MOST interesting and enjoyable affair of the week was the physical training demonstration given by the girls of the Y. W. C. A. at the Y. M. C. A. on Friday night under direction of the physical director, Miss Alice Davis.

The classes are large, of about 100 in all, and the junior class is composed of 22 members. Their work in unison was excellent and they were energetic and showed splendid training throughout. The program, which was varied, was well executed by the marching tactics to the aesthetic dancing and the basketball game, which was the final number.

The girls all made a pretty picture as they marched upon the floor with their suits of white blouses with dark bloomers and dark ties. The first number was the marching tactics by the older girls, which showed many intricate steps and figures, especially in grouping.

The juniors then gave Swedish exercises with exercises of the head, arms and legs, showing the possibility of excellent development for the children.

The wand drill by the older class was very pretty. They kept perfect time and were graceful in their movements.

Folk dances by the juniors proved very interesting as the next number. The first dance was a Danish Dance of Greeting; the next "I see you," in which the little folks sang while they danced, and the last was the "Shoe-maker's dance," which was very unique.

The dumbbell drill by the seniors was well given and this was followed by Swedish exercises. The "Wild bird" aesthetic dance, given by six members of the senior class, was so gracefully executed that the young women were given an encore and graciously responded. The Indian club swinging was next and was enjoyed, as was the Swedish schottische.

Games were then played by the seniors. A game of tag was the first, which brought in several of the physical exercises they constantly use. The "Vineyard dance," by the juniors was pretty.

One of the most novel numbers of the evening was the Indian dance by a class composed of the Campfire girls of the Y. W. C. A. They were all dressed in their Indian costumes and entered into a typical Indian dance. Their war-whoop was most realistic and they made a very pretty picture as they danced around the campfire, led by their chief. A dance with the bow and arrow was also a very pretty feature of the Indian dance.

Games were then held by the juniors of the Sunset and San Jacinto schools. The little folks ran and played in the gymnasium. This part of the program caused a great deal of excitement and amusement.

The last number was a basketball game by the seniors, which was interesting in that it was very close, the teams being equally well matched. The score of the game was 4 to 2.

A large number of guests enjoyed the evening. After the program was completed, Mrs. F. R. Hutton, secretary of the Y. W. C. A., entertained the evening classes at the Elite confectionery.
