PROTESTS AGAINST MEMBERS OF PHILIPPINE COMMISSION

Resident Commissioner Asserts if Slavery Exists in the Islands the Commission Alone is Responsible.

Washington, D. C., May 6.—"The conduct of secretary Worcester is a new evidence that prompt action should be taken to relieve every one of the members of the Philippine commission from the governor general down," wrote Manuel Quezon, resident commissioner of the Philippines, in a protest filed today with secretary Garrison of the war department against Mr. Worcester's statement that slavery exists in the islands. Resident commissioner Quezon, of the Philippines, joined in the statement.

Mr. Quezon's letter says that if slavery exists in the Philippines the Philippine commission alone is responsible for the lack of proper legislation "to punish this inhuman, savage crime," and adds:

"Not until recently has this question of slavery been brought up and also for the purpose of telling the American people that the Philippine assembly, as representing the capacity of the Filipinos for self-government is a failure. Governor Forbes also gave out a statement similar to Mr. Worcester's.

"Whether or not as a matter of policy the members of the commission should be relieved, secretary Worcester has done enough not only in this case, but in previous ones, to merit the loss of privilege of being one of the administrators and legislators of a people whom he finds pleasure in slandering."

ANARCHISTS ARRESTED FOR THREATENING KING OF SPAIN

Montpellier, France, May 6.—Letters have been seized at Barcelona which indicate that Spanish anarchists contemplate an attempt against the life of King Alfonso, either in Paris or on his way there from Spain. The police have arrested four dangerous Spanish anarchists here and another at Béziers, who it is alleged, they overheard declare that he would "have the skin of Alfonso this time."

RAILROADS PREVENT "BEN HUR" COMING

Manager Howard Fong, of the El Paso theater, has received a letter from Klaw & Erlanger, the New York theatrical magnates, declaring that because the T. & P. and the T. & A. railroads have refused to ask the Texas commission for a special rate for "Ben Hur," they will be unable to send the company here for a special train, they write, "and it seems to us that this would warrant the railroads in giving a special rate." The Texas railroad commission has agreed to hear such a proposition if the railroads wish to take it up. "We have 150 people, several horses and two carloads of scenery, enough for a special train," they write, "and it seems to us that this would warrant the railroads in giving a special rate."

Manager Fong took the matter up today with E. A. Chilton, local representative of the T. & P., and he agreed to take the matter up with his people in Dallas.

Mr. Fong says railroad rates on El Paso out of seeing "The Pink Lady" and "Everywoman" last year. "It was 38 cheaper for these companies to go from Dallas to Denver and then to Los Angeles than to make the trip through El Paso to Los Angeles, so they passed us up. The railroads did it."
