LUNA AND GRANT TO REPAIR ROADS

Transcontinental Walkers Reach Deming, Coming This Way.

Deming, N. M., June 10.—The Luna county road board met F. L. Cox, county engineer of Grant county, and John Borsini, a member of the Grant county road board in the northern part of Luna county yesterday to confer concerning several roads which are partly in Luna and partly in Grant counties, and investigate the road needs of that section.

TO PUMP WATER ONTO THE MESA

Necessary to Put in Plant to Get Water Up From Reservoir—Building New Pumphouse Near County Club. Work of irrigating water runs on the mesa overlooking the city will be undertaken in a very short time and by the time the street paving is finished on the mesa and the street line is completed on there, water will be supplied. El Paso Men Spend \$40,000 For Hats

For Shoes They Go to \$100,000 and Do Not Take to the Low Heeled Kind Which New York Likes. By NORMAN M. WALKER.

MEN milliners sell \$40,000 worth of hats to the male population of El Paso during the summer season. This estimate is based upon figures furnished by one of the men's furnishing dealers who makes a specialty of top prices for the busy business men. His estimate of the number of straw hats sold over the counters of the El Paso furnishing stores during the summer season is an even 10,000, which would be sufficient to top off one-fifth of the total population of this city.

These hats will average \$2 each, not counting the high ones our friends from Mexico buy. The Santa Fe bridge, en route to make railroad right of ways in Arizona and New Mexico, is a big business for the summer. 
