BEN GRIFFIN IS KILLED IN MEXICO

Confirmation of Slaying of American by Bandits Received by Mexico North Western Officials. Mexico North Western officials have received confirmation of the killing of Ben Griffin, an American saw miller, at the Madera lumber mills, who was killed by bandits at Chulchupa, a Mexican colony in the mountains of western Chihuahua. The killing occurred 10 days ago and was not done by either Castillo's or Villa's men. The bandits demanded \$500 from Griffin and another man named Smith. The Americans did not have it and Griffin was executed. Smith was allowed to escape. The report was brought here Thursday evening by Americans from the Madera district of Chihuahua. Griffin was about 30 years old and was thought to have come from north Texas to Madera, two years ago. He worked as a saw miller in the woods near Madera. An effort is being made to locate his relatives by the North Western company officials.
