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GRAIN STRENGTH AFTER WEAK START BEARISH TONE

Leading Issues Go to Best Prices of the Week's Movement.

NOTE—All market news on this page reflects closing sale prices unless buy or bid be specified. Friday, July 25.

New York, July 25.—In comparison with its recent course, today's market showed considerable early irregularity, leading issues declining lower, while other stock minor areas were up one to three points.

Overnight news was of a mixed character, including information of more definite anti-trust policy by Washington, and lower London prices for American stocks. This was offset by a rise in French bonds, a favorable statement by the central banks and strength in foreign copper.

Before noon, however, the local market showed a decided upward trend, almost four points, with best prices for the present movement in Steel. The market closed irregularly, Government bonds were irregular.

Harriman stocks figured conspicuously in the market. The closing June earnings of Union Pacific including increased buying of that stock, and the fact that the company had significant copper, steel and coal, selling materially over yesterday's closing prices.

The forenoon advance caused a better feeling respecting money and interest conditions, and the market extended to all classes of stocks, including those recently scrutinized in bank loans. Additional volume of one point was made in the active list, while specialties were up one to five points.
