Mills and Factories Close.
In accordance with the mayor's annual labor day proclamation, the shops, mills, factories and many of the stores closed during the day. The mechanical industries, the work on the big buildings and in many of the offices stopped for the entire day, while the stores and shops closed for the afternoon and evening. The streets were practically deserted during the afternoon and business was generally suspended during the day. The postoffice observed holiday hours, the banks closed all day.

May Go Abroad.

Meals Routine Eliminated.
All routine except that which is absolutely necessary was suspended at Port Bliss and on the border patrol Monday for Labor day. Many soldiers and officers came down town on shore leave Monday afternoon to attend the games and prize fights.

Like Old Days.
Monday morning from 10 until 11 was like old Sunday evening days, the postoffice was closed, the streets were filled with people waiting to get their morning mail. The line extended out of the lobby and into the lobby. While the general delivery and stamp windows were open.

ANCIENT CITY OF GUARARA EXPLORED

Extensive Ruins Near Mountainair, N. M., Yielding Interesting Relics.

MANY UNDERGROUND KIVAS ARE FOUND

MOUNTAINAIR, N. M., Sept. 1.—Following the presentation of the Guarara ruins to the Museum of New Mexico by Messrs. Durlay, McCoy and Corbett, of Mountainair, the School of American Archaeology has commenced the study and excavations of the site.

The work of the past week has consisted of the preliminary mapping of the site and the exploration of the ruins and walls in the town and vicinity. The map shows an ancient town of 15 terraced houses, arranged in a series of quadrangles.

A number of the underground kivas or sanctuaries have been located and are being explored. In addition, the ruins of the old mission church have revealed an extensive ecclesiastical establishment of the early part of the 17th century.

The walls and fortifications of the ancient town and Spanish mission are found to have been more extensive and complete than of any other site up to this time explored in the southwest.

The town was surrounded by a stone wall of massive construction and certain of the courts of the pueblo were further fortified by inner fortifications. Walls were also constructed outside the main fortifications to defend the fields and crops from the attacks of hostile Indians.

The large mound to the south of the mission church, which is 200 feet by 125 feet in dimensions, proves to be the principal burial place of the old pueblo. Thirteen bodies have been uncovered, owing to the fact that they are the first Tigua skeletons to be scientifically studied.

NEW MEXICO SENATOR WOULD GET READY FOR SERVICE IN MEXICO OR ELSEWHERE.

ARMY NOT LARGE ENOUGH FOR SERVICE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 1.—"The United States army should be strengthened by doubling the number of infantry regiments, doubling the number of cavalry regiments and increasing the field artillery." So declared senator Thomas B. Catron, of New Mexico, a member of the committee on military affairs.

Senator Catron is the only Republican Confederate soldier in the United States senate. With the exception of William Mahone, of Virginia, he is probably the only Confederate Republican who ever sat in the senate, and it may be said that Mahone's Republicanism was not deep enough to cause him pain, while Catron is such a Republican as gladdens the hearts of the standpatters.

"Our army is entirely inadequate to meet present necessities," explained senator Catron. "Before the Spanish war we had 25 regiments of infantry and 10 regiments of cavalry, all stationed within the continental limits of the United States. Now, besides a large increase of population in the past 15 years, we have to have troops stationed in the Philippines, in Hawaii, in Panama and Alaska, and the army must be increased to meet the needs of the present and the future."

"We need a larger army for training officers and men, and to meet emergency needs," he said. "Just such a war as we are now facing in Mexico and may have to face almost any time in the future. We ought to be prepared for war and we can't be prepared with an army only half large enough."

REGULARS ARRIVE MONDAY TO TAKE PLACES OF SOLDIERS SENT TO CHIHUAHUA.


WILSON'S ENVOY IS STILL AT VERACRUZ
