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TRADERS TRY TO BRING REACTION

Union Pacific is the Only One to Respond by Showing Weakness.

New York, Sept. 19. - Traders worked for a reaction today, on the theory that the buoyancy of the market late yesterday was merely the result of a drive at the short interest, which had been largely reduced on the recent advance in the price of water rights.

Bidding became more confident as the market began to exhibit a stronger tone.

Reading, People's Gas, Seaboard preferred, Northern Pacific and Consolidated Government gave demonstrations of strength at intervals, and the whole list showed a stronger tone at noon.

Advances in the cooler righted greater proportions, but the balance of the list did not rise with its earlier enthusiasm. Backwardness of Union Pacific acted as a drag and there was some hesitation also in the movements of Southern and Amalgamated.

A fresh outbreak of liquidation in Rock Island turned a watering market into a heavy one. All the Rock Island issues touched their lowest level since their weakness became conspicuous.

WHEAT IS HEAVY

Oats Ease in Sympathy with Other Grains; Provisions Lower.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 19. - Apparent certainty that wheat and flour would be on the free list, made wheat here today heavy. The opening was unchanged to 1/2c lower, and the market closed 1/2c lower.

The close was steady at prices ranging from last night's level to 1/2c down. Clear weather, favorable shipments from the farms brought about weakness in corn. Prices started 1/2c to 3/4c off, and later showed a 1/2c rise.

The close was steady, 1/4 to 1/2c lower. Oats eased in sympathy with other grain.

Provisions sales were unchanged to 1/2c lower. The market however, gave no evidence of any particular pressure.
