Mother's Influence Causes Son to Confess To Charge of Robbery

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 27.—A mother's influence was directly responsible today for the confession, in the criminal court of T. A. ("Dandy") Vancy, of Birmingham, Ala., charged with robbing a traveling man named E. W. DeLangton, of St. Louis and Los Angeles, after using L. C. McCorkle, of Tusculuma, Ala., as an accomplice.

Vancy told how he induced McCorkle to go to a fashionable Memphis hotel early in July, registering with the name of a merchant, and wait for the result. Next day DeLangton received a telephone call to come to a certain room in the hotel; that a merchant wanted to buy a bill of goods. In the room DeLangton was confronted with a masked man who drew a revolver and ordered DeLangton to be tied hand and foot, then robbed of \$1000. He was left tied to the bed while the merchant fled down a fire escape. He remained in the room six hours, until he pulled his hand through a noose in the rope and rang for a bellboy.

Vancy, when a witness for himself, denied the robbery, saying that DeLangton had lost his money and the robbery was a hoax. Vancy's mother, her face stained with tears, patted him on the back and forced the confession. When he appeared for sentence, Judge Edington reduced his sentence from five to three years in the Tennessee prison.

NEGRO MAY DIE FOR KILLING IN DOUGLAS

Second Death Penalty in Nine Years is Returned by Tombstone Jury

Douglas, Ariz., Sept. 27.—A special from Tombstone says: For the first time in nine years a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, with the penalty fixed at death, was returned here, when the jury in the case of Louis Nelson returned that finding.

It was charged that Nelson entered the Copper City club, a negro resort in Douglas, on the night of June 7, 1913, shot and killed Albert Jones and seriously wounded a piano player.

The last time the death penalty was assessed was in the case of C. Eredija, better known as "Chico," for the killing of deputy sheriff White at Black Diamond. He was later reprieved and given a life imprisonment.

Sentence on Nelson will be pronounced Monday at 10 o'clock by Judge Lockwood.

The jury in the case of Eduardo Vaughan, a Mexican negro, charged with assaulting Mrs. Ren Malden, of Douglas, last spring, returned a verdict of guilty. He will also be sentenced Monday. The penalty for this offense ranges from five years to life imprisonment.

BAILEY'S PICTURE REPLACES HOUSTON'S

Artist Who Painted the Houston Portrait Says State Did Not Buy It and He Removes It

Austin, Texas, Sept. 27.—A life sized portrait of former senator Joseph Wood Bailey, brought here today by Boris S. Gordon, an artist of Houston, was this afternoon removed from the senate chamber. An unusual feature of the procedure was that it was placed in the exact spot where has hung for the past several years a portrait of Gen. Sam Houston. The latter portrait was taken out, as Mr. Gordon pointed out, as the state had never sought to purchase it. Mr. Gordon said that he had been commissioned to paint the Bailey picture by a number of the friends of the senator.

The placing of the Bailey picture in the senate chamber makes sense, as the Bailey issue, as such portraits are usually placed in the senate chamber only with the consent of the senate.

GENERAL MOALTE IS PNEUMONIA VICTIM

One of Two Men Who Heard First and Last Gun of War Fought in Every War Since Then.

San Francisco, Calif., Sept. 27.—Brig. Gen. Edward Moalte died today of pneumonia, aged 72, at the hotel Stewart, where he has been living since his retirement from the army. He was one of the best known military men in the country. It was his unique distinction to have heard the first gun of the civil war fired at Fort Sumter, and the last one fired at Appomattox. Gen. Moalte served his country in every war and all serious military trouble this country has been involved in, since the close of the civil war, being in the Cuban campaign, the Boxer troubles and the Philippines. For many years he fought Indians in Montana and elsewhere on the border country.

Aged Man Forgets His Name and Destination

An aged man with a long beard and a hickory suit was taken in charge by station master John Mershon and patting A. A. Funk Saturday evening at the union station. The old man, who was infirm and in feeble health, had forgotten where he was going and seemed dazed and unable to tell his name or how he happened to be in El Paso. He will be cared for until his identity is established and his relatives notified.

The man had money with him and was dressed, but his memory had failed him and he could say nothing more than that he had come from Oklahoma to El Paso.

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BELMONT MAY APPEAR IN THE SULZER TRIAL

Board of Managers to Investigate Report Governor Solicited Contribution From Race Track Men.

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 27.—Attorneys for the board of managers of the impeachment trial of governor William Sulzer were today furnished with the information that during the gubernatorial campaign a Sulzer agent called upon August Belmont with the demand that the racing men in this state contribute \$50,000 to the Sulzer fund.

It was learned that Mr. Belmont informed the solicitor that the racing interests did not care to make a concrete contribution, but that the leading race track owners would probably be glad to make individual contributions.

As a result of this information it is expected that August Belmont, millionaire banker and race track owner, will be called as a witness before the court of impeachment next week.

Chas. F. Murphy, head of Tammany Hall, will not be called as a witness before the impeachment court by the attorneys for the prosecution, according to a statement made tonight by John B. Stanchfield, one of the attorneys for the board of managers of the trial.

RAINS DAMAGE RICE AND COTTON IN TEXAS

New Orleans, La., Sept. 27.—Heavy rains, riding a terrific gale, have done great damage to the cotton and rice crops of Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, according to reports from various points throughout the area.

Within the last two days, Shreveport, the Louisiana cotton center, has been deluged with 2 1/4 inches of rain and other sections of the state have received fully as much. Cyclonic winds have made the rainstorms all the more destructive. Rice men say they cannot estimate the damage that was done to the rice crop.

SUIT OF NUN FOR SUPPORT DISMISSED

Oklahoma Woman Sought to Have Benedictine Sisters Give Her \$17,000—Admits Subscribing to Rules.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Sept. 27.—The trial which has occupied the attention of the Logan county district court at Guthrie since early Friday in which Miss Anna Lowrey, a former nun, asked for damages amounting to \$17,150 from the congregation of the Benedictine Sisters, was suddenly ended late Saturday by Judge H. E. Huston sustaining a demurrer of the defendants to the evidence of the plaintiff, thus taking the case from the jury and ordering the case dismissed.

For 11 years Anna Lowrey was known at St. Joseph's academy near Guthrie as "Sister Justina," where she was a teacher. In her petition she set up her claim for life support as she had entered the congregation for life.

During her cross examination by the defense the rules of the Benedictines were read to her and to each of them she admitted having subscribed and pledged her implicit obedience. The case may be appealed.

Erects Own Wireless To Secure Correct Time

Augusta, Ga., Sept. 27.—O. P. Davis, a jeweler of this city, is erecting a wireless station to catch the correct time as it is being flashed out daily from Washington. His aerial will consist of six strands of phosphor bronze wire hung between two 50 foot poles. The poles will have the top of the building for the foundation.

New York, N. Y., Sept. 27.—The last couple married by father Hans Schmidt, self confessed slayer of Anna Amuller, was Frederick Mitchell, of St. Louis, Mo., and Miss Pauline Bucher, of New York. They were married August 11, the day Schmidt confessed he made up his mind to kill Anna Amuller.

"Father Schmidt showed no signs of insanity when he married us," declared Mrs. Mitchell today. "I have attended St. Joseph's Catholic church, where he was a cadet for some time, and I never saw anything wrong with him. He was always kind and courteous in his duties. He was always exhorting mothers to watch their daughters and sons and keep them out of mischief. I cannot think of him as a murderer."
