CATTLEMEN GAIN IMPORTANT POINT

Roswell Judge Decides They Have Right to Impound Rain Waters for Use of Their Cattle. Roswell, N. M., Sept. 25.—Judge John T. McClure in the district court handed down an opinion which recognizes the rights of cattlemen under an act of 1909 regarding torrential waters to ap-

propriate the waters without filling the applications required of others than stockmen who are, by the act previously passed, relieved from this requirement. It also recognizes these appropriations as superior to subsequent applications for any other purpose. The opinion comes as a result of the trial of the case of Earl L. Netherlin vs. J. B. Brown et al, in which they were suing for an injunction to enjoin waters in Four Mile gulch in the Chavez county Panhandle from being dammed for stock purposes.
