**DEMONIACS FIRST**

Is Organized Following Agricultural Institute, Which Was Largely Attended.

Deming, N. M., Oct. 2.—The farmers' chautauqua in New Mexico, and possibly the first strictly farmers' chautauqua in the United States, has been formed here. The organization of the chautauqua followed the one-day institute held at the farm of the Little Vineyard company, near here.

Following the address given by Ralph C. Ely on the benefits of such an organization, officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, Ph. C. Ely; secretary, Willard E. Holt; treasurer, Edward L. Pollard; executive board, Ralph C. Ely, Taylor, Charles Ely and Wright Shaw.

The heads of all farmers' organizations in the county are the vice-presidents. This movement, it is believed, will have the tendency to bring to Luna county the best expert knowledge in agricultural and horticultural affairs, and next year there will be held a four days' chautauqua and expert lectures will be delivered on matters that pertain directly to the prosperity of irrigation farmers, their social and intellectual advancement, the improvement of the home and fireside and to every condition surrounding agricultural life in this valley.

**URGES SABOTAGE; IS GIVEN SENTENCE**

Speaker For Industrial Workers of the World Convicted of Advising Strikers to Destroy Goods.

Paterson, N. J., Oct. 2.—Frederick S. Boyd, of New York, one of the speakers connected with the Industrial Workers of the World, was sentenced to prison today for publicly advocating sabotage. His term will range from a year to seven years, depending on his behavior. In addition, he was fined \$500.

Boyd was convicted last week of having advised strikers in the silk mills to destroy goods if they had to go back to work without obtaining their demands. Sentences were pronounced on the indictments was suspended, but the court promised to impose it if Boyd ever returned to Paterson and repeated the offense.

Boyd will appeal. This is the first conviction for advocating sabotage that has grown out of the strike.

**VILLEGAS KILLING MYSTERY UNSOLVED**

Officers Unable to Determine Who Shot Boy, Companions Released from Jail by Judge Jackson.

As far as the local officers are concerned, the death of Jose Villegas, who was shot and killed in a watermelon patch in the Valverde addition last Tuesday, remains unsolved.

Andres Laruna, a three boys who was with the Villegas boys at the time, and held by the officers after the killing, was released by Judge Jackson. The boy refused to be shaken from his first story. He said he was telling the truth. Finally the judge let him go.

**COMMITTEE TO PASS ON MINING COMPANIES**

Chamber of Commerce Directors Appoint Permanent Committee to Investigate New Concerns.

The chamber of commerce, in order to encourage and give legitimate publicity to reliable mining industries that may be established within El Paso's territory, is to have a mining committee. The board of directors has appointed a permanent mining committee, composed of Robert Silberberg, chairman; J. J. Ormsbee, H. B. Stevens, D. W. Rockwell, L. H. Davis and J. E. McAlister.

The committee will investigate the reliability of mining concerns that may come into El Paso and report its findings to the board. It is to make any recommendations it feels necessary for or concerning mining concerns in the territory tributary to El Paso.

**WORK STARTED ON FOUR NEW HOUSES**

Each Will Be Two Stories and Have Nine Rooms; Total Cost to Be Approximately \$30,000.

Four houses were started Friday by J. I. Hewitt and Sons, contractors. The houses are to be two stories in height and average nine rooms each. One will be built of buff brick and the other three will be pebble dash finish. They will have all the modern built-in features. The houses are located in the Richmond Terrace near the Country club, on the paved boulevard, and are being erected by the Government Hill company. The approximate cost of the four houses is \$30,000.

**STREET RAILWAY EXTENDING LINES**

Three New Lines Are Being Arranged in Various Parts of the City at the Present Time.

Three street car extensions are now in process of construction or are to be started at once. The Piedras street line in Alta Vista, from the Fort Bliss car line to Riverview street in Manhattan Heights, is being constructed, the north mesa car line, which will run from Oregon street to Hague street, and the north Hague street to Kansas street, is being graded, and the street car officials are now laying out the new 10th street line, which will run from the Mexico car line at 10th street east to Campbell street and north on Campbell to Seventh street, to connect with the Second ward car line.

This last line is being built to accommodate the employees of the Pearson plant. The north mesa line is being graded by the property owners on North Oregon street and on the high mesa. It will run for eight blocks on Oregon and east on Hague street for three blocks to Kansas street, but will be extended further east on the mesa as soon as the property is improved on the mesa. The Manhattan Heights line up Piedras street is being built to serve the new Manhattan addition and will run within four blocks of the Highland Park car line.

**REBELS WILL NOT QUIT MEXICO**

Plans For Provisional Government Do Not Include Secession.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—The "Constitutionalist" are about to form a provisional government to control territory held by them, the word received in Washington by "Constitutionalist" representatives here. This is to be done in order to combine all revolutionary forces against the present government to oppose Huerta. The word received here said the "Constitutionalist" have no intention of seceding from the rest of Mexico.

While this development was expected to have an important bearing on the Mexican situation, it was not thought in official circles that it will change the attitude of the administration. This attitude is expected to be that any government elected at a fair election will be recognized.

Manuel Gonzalez has left for Hermosillo, headquarters of Carranza. It was said here that he will be named minister of finance in the provisional cabinet which is to be formed.

Eduardo Hay has returned to Washington. He said that there is no disposition on the part of the "Constitutionalist" leaders to divide Mexico.

**MISS ZUNIGA BEL PASO HER WORK IN EL PASO**

Douglas Girl Who Was Held in Juarez Says She Was Well Treated by Mexican Officials.

Miss Concepcion Zuniga, the Douglas, Ariz. girl who was held in Juarez on suspicion of being a spy, reported for work at the Postal Telegraph office Friday afternoon. She was liberated here Thursday afternoon and came to the American side, after a visit with friends on the Mexican side.

Saterfield, acting general agent of the Conference for Education in Texas, said: "Believing that the solution of the educational problem in Texas lies in first establishing good schools for the farmers' children, the Conference for Education in Texas has placed first in its program for a statewide educational campaign, the problems of establishing of rural high schools. These subjects are to be discussed at the coming general session of the Conference, which is to be held in Dallas on Education day of the State fair, Saturday, November 1st."

**TARIFF BILL SENT TO THE WHITE HOUSE**

Pens Used in Signing New Law Will Be Presented to Underwood and Simmons.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—The tariff bill, bearing the signatures of speaker Clark and vice president Marshall, which the Democratic tariff measure since 1897, reached the white house at 2:30 Friday, but the president kept it from signing the measure until 9 o'clock, the time fixed for the leaders to witness the signature.

President Wilson refused throughout the day repeated requests from moving picture concerns and photographers to be present when the tariff bill is signed. He took the position that the signing of a legislative act of so great importance should be a dignified occasion, but the requests were pressing and the white house from all sides and there was some hope that the picture men might at least photograph the group after the bill was signed.

The president decided to sign the bill with two pens. The pen with which he will write the name "Woodrow" will be given to representative Underwood and the other which completes his signature will be presented to senator Simmons.

**MINE GUARDS TO GIVE UP WEAPONS**

Blanket License is Revoked When It Appears That Guns Are First To Be Shot.

Calumet, Mich., Oct. 2.—Mine guards and other employees of the Amesick Mining Co., a subsidiary of the Calumet and Hecla in the Weeweenaw county copper strike district, may no longer carry concealed weapons. The blanket license issued by the county authorities giving right to the company was today revoked. Sheriff Sefting and prosecuting attorney Hamilton, who revoked the license, said the mine guards have been responsible for the shooting in the district. They reached this decision after investigation of alleged attacks by strikers on the special train which brought the mine guards into the district last Monday night, convinced that the first shots were fired from the train.

Although the strikers were noisy at the Calumet today, Gen. Hancock had complete control of the situation. Troops from Keweenaw points were the only ones needed, the cavalry remaining in Calumet.

At the Quincy, near Hancock, four strikers were arrested for alleged intimidation, but elsewhere the strike zone was quiet.

**EL PASO'S GRAND JURY DISCHARGED**

September Term of District Court Closes Saturday and Judge Jackson Will Go to El Paso.

Following the final report of the grand jury, Judge Dan M. Jackson, of the 24th district court, discharged the county grand jury Friday morning. The grand jury returned 10 indictments. The written report of the grand jury will be submitted this afternoon.

Judge Jackson appointed M. McKinley, of Clint, Tex.; Seth Orndorff, of Belen, and J. B. Donahue, of El Paso, as special grand jurors to select the grand jury for the next term of the district court, which will convene the first Monday in November.

**DENY COMPLICITY IN AEROPLANE CASE**

Tucson, Ariz., Oct. 2.—A complete denial of the charges of a violation of neutrality laws in connection with the Masson aeroplane incident was made today by E. A. Anaya, chief of the Arizona department. Capt. Hughes is stationed at Yuma. He said conditions in Mexico are far from being settled, but in fact, it is his opinion that intervention by the United States or some other foreign power is the only way in which peace can be restored in the sister republic.

Tresley B. Starkey, aged 32 years, died at his home in Culberson, Friday morning. He was a health seeker here and his body will be shipped this afternoon to his home in McAlester, Okla. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Alice Starkey, who was with him at the time of his death, and the body back to Oklahoma.

**FIFTY CHINESE IN OJINAGA DESTITUTE**

Mar Wing Kee, "mayor of Chinatown" has received a message from Presidio, Tex., that there are 50 Chinese in there and that an effort would be made to have them brought to the American side, as they were destitute and there was nothing for them to get provisions in the Mexican town, which is in the control of the rebels. The Chinese are thought to be refugees from Santa Rosalia.

**GEN. FELIX DIAZ NOW ON WAY TO MEXICO**

New York, Oct. 2.—According to a special dispatch from Havre, Gen. Felix Diaz embarked there on the German liner "Carnegie" and is expected to reach Mexico City on Friday. It is reported that former president Porfirio Diaz has rented a villa at Biarritz for the winter, indicating his intention to remain in France.

**CARRANZA DENIES SECESSION PLAN**

J. L. Perez, who signs himself "Constitutionalist commercial agent," telegraphing The El Paso Herald from Naco, Arizona, says he is authorized to deny that Carranza has any plan that a confederate union is to be formed. He terms such an idea a "stupendous invention from our political enemies."
