

THE ROMAN RACE THRILLS HORSE SHOW SPECTATORS AT WASHINGTON PARK

Pioneer Stage Coach Party Recalls Old Days on the Frontier; Artillery Drill Wins Applause From the Audience and the Polo Tournament Claims the Attention of the Military Men.

THOSE ancient Romans put it over us like an umbrella when they invented the Roman race. We are still, after all these centuries, hog-tied and helpless when it comes to inventing anything else that could take its place as an appeal to the crowd.

Another hit was scored by the artillery drill of a complete gun section of battery C, Sixth Field artillery. The maneuvers of the artillerymen were cheered every step of their way.

The different saddle entries aroused a great deal of interest and admiration, and everybody was happy.

With their brilliant playing, splendid team work, and speedy ponies, the 15th cavalry polo team, which has become so popular in El Paso, put it over the crowd polo team of the 15th cavalry, scoring 7 to 2.

Opening the horse show, the first event was the high jump class "A." The enlisted men exhibited first, followed by the officers. First place was won by "Peggy," ridden by private William J. Sweeney, 1st signal corps.

In the officers' exhibition, "The Rebel," ridden by Lieut. E. V. Armstrong, 15th cavalry, won first place; "Sandy," ridden by Lieut. Henry Meyers, 13th cavalry, second; and "Commodore," ridden by Capt. Raymond Bamberger, 15th cavalry, third.

There was some confusion in the next event—the enlisted men's steeple chase, as the winning horse, "Rusty," ridden by private Skull, was disqualified because it was privately owned.

"George Guyton," a beautiful horse, Capt. J. M. Burroughs's charger, "George Guyton," won the blue ribbon and silver cup in the officers' charger class.

The polo scramble, one-quarter mile dash, was won by Lieut. E. V. Armstrong, 15th cavalry, who was left behind in the first forward dash, worked up past the others, and finished just a neck behind "The Rebel."

The Roman race aroused every bit of sporting blood in the audience. The troopers as they rode up for the race were greeted with applause, and when the race was on the crowd was brought to its feet and yelled encouragement and approval.
