The \$500 bond of secretary Skinner, furnished by the American Surety Co., was accepted. The charter was closed and the initiation fee was increased. PLANS ALL MADE FOR "GO TO CHURCH" DAY

Committees of Pastors and Laymen to Report at Luncheon Wednesday and Campaign Is Fully Inaugurated. Plans for promoting an "Everybody go to church day" in El Paso have been practically completed. A large general committee of pastors and two laymen from each church has been organized, with Rev. Jno. E. Abbott, pastor of the Westminster church, as chairman, and Dr. Willis W. Waite as secretary. Two meetings of this committee have been held and various subcommittees have been appointed. The day designated as "Everybody go to church day" is January 11, and every effort will be made by the church people to induce people to attend the services of some church. The movement is in no sense sectarian or denominational. No pressure will be brought to bear upon anyone to attend any particular church. A full list of the churches in the city will be published with the location of each, and the hours at which services are to be held. People may choose for themselves where they shall attend, but everybody will be urged to attend some church service. It is a democratic enterprise, the pastors say. It is not for any class or condition of people. It is hoped by those promoting the movement that the poor may sit in the pews with the rich, and that all will receive like consideration. So far as known no church in El Paso has its pews rented. The first to come will be the first to be claimed, no matter how they may be dressed or what their occupation. There will be another meeting of the general committee at the Sheldon hotel Wednesday noon, when reports will be heard from the various committees that have been appointed and the plans more fully developed. The committee expects to have as its guests at the luncheon Wednesday night, Mr. E. Kelly and the judges of the various courts. The campaign for the observance of an "Everybody go to church day" has been started with spirit and determination, it is claimed.

QUAKER OATS CO. IS INVOLVED IN SUIT

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 30.—Suit for \$10,000,000 damages was filed in the United States district court here late Monday against the Quaker Oats company, its directors and the directors of the Great Western Cereal company, William A. Tilden and Charles D. Thompson, receivers of the cereal company, are plaintiffs. The suit was brought under section 7 of the Sherman anti-trust law, and was the result of the sale of the trade names and principal properties of the cereal company to the Quaker Oats company, June 22, 1911. The \$10,000,000 realized by the sale, it is charged, was taken by the holders of \$1,000,000 of the cereal company's bonds, leaving the holders of \$9,000,000 worth of stock only the name of the company and minor property as assets. The law, it was held, provides that complaining stockholders can claim punitive damages in three times the amount of the capital stock. Directors of the cereal company named in the suit were: Joy Morton, Sterling Morton, F. R. Bliss, Jr., Edward H. Stearns, S. T. Butler, Daniel Peterkin, Mark Morton, Mendell J. Wright, J. P. Gates, W. S. Lawrence and F. P. Sawyer. James H. Douglas, John Stuart, A. Stamford White, John P. Weiling, J. R. Nutt, James H. Andrews and Whiting G. Snow are named as directors of the Quaker Oats company.

RAILROADS DEFEND RIGHT TO CHARGE FOR "SPOTTING" CARS

Washington, D. C., Dec. 30.—In a brief filed in the supreme court of the United States the right of railroads to charge extra compensation for delivery of cars on industrial or spur tracks in cities was defended by attorneys for the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe railroads. The railroads are seeking to have the court uphold the commerce court in enjoining an order of the interstate commerce commission, which held invalid a charge of \$2.50 for this service in San Francisco and Los Angeles.

SHAKSPERE SPECIAL TO ARRIVE LATER

Sothern-Marlowe Company, Delayed by Wreck Near Del Rio, Finally Moves Westward. After having been "tied up" for more than 24 hours behind a derailed freight train near Del Rio, Tex., the special train carrying the Sothern-Marlowe company of Shakspearean players will arrive in El Paso this afternoon and preparations for presenting "Home and Juliet" at the El Paso theater tonight will begin. No matinee was given. Tickets purchased for the show scheduled for Monday night or Tuesday afternoon will be good for tonight's performance, according to H. B. McMillen, receiver for the El Paso Theater company.

LUCK PURSUES SPECIAL

Ill luck has pursued the Shakspeare special ever since it crossed the Texas border some days ago. Floods in the southeastern portion of the state, and the consequent interruption of railway communication, upset the plans of the company time and again. It was believed that, after leaving San Antonio last Saturday, the run of hard luck was ended, but Sunday morning's freight wreck near the Devil's river, west of Del Rio, indicated the continued presence of the "jinx." An observation and dining car, a Pullman coach, five special scenery cars and private cars for Mr. Sothern and Miss Marlowe make up the special train.

WRECK UPSETS SCHEDULES

A general upsetting of train schedules resulted after the wreck Sunday morning. No. 101, the Sunset limited, due to reach here Monday night at 10 o'clock, arrived shortly after noon today. No. 9, due here at 6:30 Monday evening, did not arrive until 3:15 this afternoon. No one was injured in the wreck. Twenty-five cars and an engine were derailed.

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FINDS REASON FOR FAILURE OF TUBERCULOSIS SERUMS

Paris, France, Dec. 30.—The reason for the failure of tuberculin serums and vaccines to effect cures is indicated in an announcement by Dr. Pierre Roux, director of the Pasteur Institute to the Academy of Sciences. It has been observed that all other germs which multiply rapidly together, die if cultivated with tubercle bacilli after the lapse of 10 to 15 days. His experiments have established the fact that cultures of tubercle bacilli within that period give off a poison fatal to any other form of microbe. A few drops of a 40 to 50 day tubercle culture added to any culture medium prevents the propagation of other germs. This toxin, which has been isolated, is characteristic of tubercle bacilli and other toxins, such as those from diphtheria and tetanus. It resists the action of heat and is neutralized neither by anti-tuberculosis serum or ordinary blood serum. If anything it is less affected by the former than by the latter. Further experiments have shown that this toxin, when injected into animals forms no counterpoise and it is deduced that because of this both vaccines and serums intended for the cure of tuberculosis are without effect.

HEAVY snows in New Mexico have delayed trains on the eastern division of the El Paso & Southwestern greatly. The snowfall was especially heavy at Dawson and Duran, being reported by engineers to be up to the eap windows in places. Snow plows have been used where the drifts were deepest and the intense cold weather which prevails in eastern New Mexico has added to the discomfort of trainmen.
