

Pecos City Marshal Killed

Is Shot by Unknown Mexican, Who Makes His Escape Afterward.

Pecos, Tex., Feb. 9.—T. Y. Moorehead, city marshal of Pecos, was killed here at 9:26 last night by an unknown Mexican. He had been to church and with the constable and with the sheriff and night watchman, went into "Mexican town" to investigate a carnival. They halted two strange Mexicans in the street and one, without speaking, pulled a revolver and shot the marshal, striking Moorehead's nose and killing him instantly. The other officers emptied their guns in the bright moonlight at the fleeing figure but did not stop him. They found an overcoat with two bullet holes in it but the fugitive is not thought to be seriously wounded, as no trace of him has yet been discovered. Five prizes of \$500 are posted. The Mexican was of small stature and will have a bullet hole in his clothes on the right side, midway of the ribs. There is possibly another bullet hole in his right trousers leg. Moorehead was a fearless officer and punched cows here in the eighties. His parents live in McLachlan, Okla., where he spent his boyhood. He was born in Virginia. The whole of the Pecos country is greatly aroused.
