

To Sign Road to the Dam

This Will Be Done on Auto Trip on Feb. 23; Other Trips Planned.

Signs will be carried when the El Paso Automobile club run is made to Elephant Butte dam on Feb. 21, and they will be posted at all road forks, exits and turns. These signs are badly needed, as the road is cluttered in places and it is hard to follow.

The trip was postponed from last Saturday and about the same number of people will make the trip Saturday week.

President Rinehart, of the club, has in mind a tour for a Sunday to Lees Ferry dam, which is at the mouth of the valley, and all good roads, and then, perhaps, another on the west side of the river, into a region hitherto little known to El Pasoans, but now easily accessible because of the new roads.

He also has a plan to make a club run to Biebes some time during the coming summer.

When the club postponed the trip to Elephant Butte last Saturday, the entire party was not held back. A Ford car, occupied by M. C. Shedd, E. C. Rockmeyer, H. S. Gitman, and H. W. Shedd had decided to go with the club and made the trip notwithstanding the loss of the leaders and guides. Speaking of the trip, H. W. Shedd said:

"The start from El Paso was made at 5 o'clock Saturday morning and the Cruces was reached at 7 o'clock, where a good warm breakfast was eaten. During this part of the trip, all the water that was carried in the car was frozen, with the exception of that in the radiator, and the running boards were sheets of ice. Forty minutes were lost in Cruces before the run was again started over the Organ road, which was followed until the branch road to Turquoise ranch was reached. This kept the road high above the valley and missed all the heavy sands

MINERS' LOW PAY SUBJECT OF HEARING

Counsel for Miners Exhibits Pay Envelopes Showing Many Deductions Made by Mining Companies.

Hancock, Mich., Feb. 19.—Deductions for such items as "hospital care and board" were shown on some of the miners' pay envelopes offered in evidence before the congressional strike investigating committee today.

"We will prove," said O. M. Hilton, counsel for the Western Federation of Miners, "that in many instances the mining company would take out of the employee's pay the amount owed the company and then would pay the storekeeper and the boarding house keeper from what was left."

The exhibits covered a wide period, some dating back as far as 1938.

A. W. Kerr, assisting Hilton, explained the system of pay used by the companies. All underground workers, except the miner, he said, were paid a day wage. The miner worked on contract.

William J. Rickard, president of the Calumet local of the Western Federation of Miners, then resumed the witness stand and continued the story he began last night.

"What would happen if a miner refused a contract tendered him by a mine boss?" asked Mr. Kerr.

"He would have to work somewhere else," the witness replied.

The witness told about the miners' local union and its connection with the Western Federation. A strike was ordered by referendum vote although, he said, the Federation officers opposed it.

The men insisted on going out because conditions were growing worse, said Rickard.

COUNTY BALANCE EXCEEDS \$11,000

Work of Preparing New Budget Is Delayed, Pending Opinion of Attorney General on Bond Issue.

Out of the general budget fund of the county for the fiscal year ending January 31, there is a balance of \$11,000.73 left, as shown by the report of county auditor Roy Barnum. The fund for the year amounted to \$1,740. The expenditures were given as \$1,629,242.21. While 12 of the accounts showed deficits amounting to \$3,378.71, there were 14 which showed unexpended balances totaling \$13,361.50.

The special fund, the total is being shown as an expenditure of \$1,629,908.07. The appropriation of \$1,629,908.07 for the special fund is shown by the report overdrawn \$547.

While this is the time for making up a new budget for the county, the matter is being delayed on account of the proposed joint county and municipal building for which the \$400,000 bonds were voted. The bonds are now in the hands of the attorney general for his approval. It is not known at this time just what quarters will be secured for the county offices when the erection of the new building is started, and for this reason the county auditor did not know what amounts to ask. If it is decided to tear down the county court house in connection with the new building it is probable that offices for the county will be retained in the Mills building.

CAPT. SMITH TO COMMAND CADETS

Capt. Merton F. Smith, company M, 20th infantry, has been appointed commandant of cadets at West Point military academy and ordered to proceed to West Point, N. Y., on March 20.

Capt. Smith will relieve Maj. Fred W. Sladen, the present commandant, who will return to the 11th infantry for duty. Capt. Smith has been here since the 20th infantry arrived from Fort Douglas, Utah, and has been stationed on Santa Fe street with the third battalion, which has been on bridge and patrol duty. The newly appointed commandant is a native of Grand Rapids, Mich., and was appointed to the academy in 1925. He was graduated in 1925 and was assigned to the 20th infantry, which was then stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kan. He has been attached to this regiment throughout his career in the army, except when on special details. When the Spanish war broke out, he went with his regiment to Cuba and participated in the campaign before Santiago. He was aid de camp on Gen. John C. Bate's staff during the Cuban campaign.

In 1929 he rejoined his regiment and went to the Philippines, where he participated in the island campaign under Gen. Lloyd Wheaton. He returned with his regiment for a second island campaign and was then on duty at West Point from 1936 to 1937 as senior instructor in infantry tactics. He rejoined his regiment in the Philippines for the third time on island duty and returned with the 20th to Fort Douglas, Utah, in 1932.

As commandant of cadets at West Point, Capt. Smith will have the rank of a lieutenant colonel and will serve for three years unless ordered on special duty in the field. He is unmarried.

MEXICAN POTATOES GOOD, SAYS EXPERT

Mexican potatoes are physically fit, O. A. Pratt, potato inspector for the United States agricultural department, has returned from a trip down the North Western railroad to make an inspection of the Mexican grown potatoes which are exported to the United States. Mr. Pratt says he examined a large number of specimens of potatoes and found them in good health. He says that there is some disease among the Mexican potatoes just as there is in every human settlement. But the diseases from which the Mexican potatoes suffer are no different from the ones that afflict American potatoes. This means that Mexican potatoes may be shipped into the United States through the port of El Paso without being quarantined.

MILITANTS PICKET BISHOP'S RESIDENCE

London, Eng., Feb. 19.—The militant suffragettes made a strong effort today to prevent the bishop of London from attending the opening session of the house of lords of which he is a member. They made him the first victim of their new campaign of molesting public men. Their ire was particularly directed against the bishop for his alleged white washing of the governments in his report on the prison treatment of suffragettes.

The bishop's residence in St. James square was picketed earlier in the day by the women. Two of them acted as sentinels on the doorstep. Two other women, Miss Dunlop and Miss May Richardson, then tried to gain access to the house, but the door was slammed in their faces.

Along the route from Buckingham palace to the house of lords the authorities took the strictest precautions to prevent any attempt on the part of the suffragettes to break up the procession or reach the king with a petition.

CHALLENGE TO DUEL FOLLOWS DISPUTE

St. Petersburg, Russia, Feb. 19.—A challenge to a duel was sent today by A. Savenko, the Nationalist leader in the duma, to G. Zamiatousky, a Conservative deputy and attorney for the "black hundred."

Zamiatousky was one of the prosecuting attorneys at the trial of Mendel Belias at Kiev. In the course of the trial he alleged that Savenko had told him that M. Shulgren, editor of the newspaper Kievlianin, whose championship of Belias is generally regarded as having secured the acquittal of the accused, was actuated by the sordid motive of securing money from the Jews to support a sugar factory in which he was interested. M. Savenko declares the statement a falsehood.

THREE MAKE RACE IN CONGRESSIONAL VOTING

Davenport, Iowa, Feb. 19.—Committee chairman in all three leading parties were confident of success in today's special congressional election in which the successor of the late representative, I. S. Pepper, will be named. The candidates are: Henry Vollmer, Democrat; Harry Hull, Republican; and C. P. Hanley, "Progressive." Early reports favored Vollmer. A light vote was indicated.

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NOTICE TO THE STOCKHOLDERS OF THE EL PASO VALLEY WATER USERS' ASSOCIATION.

The following resolutions in relation to the election of officers and directors to the Board of Governors held on Feb. 14, 1934, were passed at a meeting of the Board of Governors held on Feb. 14, 1934.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE EL PASO VALLEY WATER USERS' ASSOCIATION:

Section I. That notice be and the same is hereby given that the annual election for the selection of a president and vice president and members of the Board of Governors, one to be elected from each of the nine governmental districts as heretofore defined by ordinance of the board, which election was heretofore ordered to be held on Saturday, the 14th day of February, 1934, shall be held at the Chamber of Commerce in the City of El Paso, Texas. That at such election the polls shall be open at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and shall remain open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon.

Section II. An election board of three members, to wit: T. D. Porcher, E. K. Talbot, and D. E. Doane, is hereby appointed to conduct such election and to make returns and minutes. At such election each member shall possess the following qualifications, as set forth in the resolutions heretofore adopted by the Board of Governors of this association:

(a) Shall be, at the time of the election, the owner of at least one share of capital stock of this association and shall have been the owner thereof for one year prior to the election, or shall be a resident of the association, for at least twenty (20) days before such election, provided that the owner of any acre of land situated within any of the governmental districts within said El Paso Valley Irrigation District, heretofore defined, which land was signed up and accepted by this Association under the Articles of Incorporation thereof, which land was signed up and accepted by this Association for each acre of land so owned by him and heretofore signed and accepted, or water rights, provided, however, that such land shall be situated within the El Paso Valley Irrigation District.

(b) Shall be of the age of twenty-one (21) years or more and of sound mind.

(c) He shall not be entitled to vote if the land to which such shares of stock are appurtenant shall be in arrears for any assessments heretofore made by this association or the Board of Governors thereof.

(d) He shall not be entitled to vote unless he has registered as the owner of land or shares of stock entitled to vote, as set forth in Clause a' of this Section and was registered at the office of this Association in the Herald Building in the City of El Paso before the first day of January, 1934.

Section III. Each voter at such election shall vote by written ballot cast in person or duly authorized written proxy.

Section IV. Each voter shall be entitled to vote for one candidate for President and one candidate for Vice President and to cast his ballot for one member of the Board of Governors to represent any district in which he shall have land duly qualified to vote as heretofore described, provided no member shall be entitled to cast more than one hundred and sixty (160) votes in all.

Section V. These resolutions shall take effect and be in force immediately after their passage and adoption, and all by-laws and resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.—Advertisement.
