FIRST OF LECTURE SERIES IS GIVEN

"Tools of Advertising" Are Shown to Ad club Members and Talks Made on Advertising and Salesmanship.

The first of a series of lectures illustrated with lantern slides, was delivered before the El Paso Ad club at the club house last evening. The lecture was part of what is known as the Nash lecture series, which are sent out by the Associated Advertisers of America as part of an educational campaign on the subject of advertising, which is being made nationwide.

Last night's subject was "The Tools of Advertising." Pictures were introduced showing the methods in which drawings, photographs, etc., play an important part in advertising. The lecturer read to the audience by M. F. Carlock, advertising manager of the White House, who prefaced it with a talk on the subject of advertising and its relation to salesmanship.

A brief talk was made by A. E. Stevens, of the American Association of Advertisers, Chas. E. Keith and Harry R. Ogg were voted in as members.

DETERMINED TO GET FOOD TO UNEMPLOYED

San Francisco, Calif., March 12.—"We are going to get food to the unemployed army in Yolo county if we have to send it through with armed men," declared J. S. Wrightman, a representative of "General" Kelley, who arrived here last night to organize relief measures.

"The treatment of these men has been one of the most brutal chapters in the history of labor," Wrightman continued. "Yesterday I saw a man of Sacramento county dumped into the river in an automobile load of bread that had been supplied by labor unions. Only hope is in keeping the men together, but starvation is weakening their spirit."

EL PASO BOY WINS PRIZE IN DEBATING

Austin, Tex., March 12.—In the Evans oratorical contest, sponsored by the auspices of the University of Texas, R. L. Skiles, of Amador, won first place and Frank Lyons, of El Paso, won second. The first prize was \$50, given by Ira H. Evans, of Austin; the second prize was \$25, given by Mr. Evans. Skiles spoke on "The Opportunity of the College Man for Service." Frank Lyons developed the phases of "Education as a Factor in International Peace."

BIDDERS FOR CUBS PLAN TOGETHER

Chicago, Ill., March 12.—Acting on a hint from Charles F. Tait that it would be well to get the bidders together, today and formed a mutually agreeable combination. Early next week a meeting of the two syndicates will be held here and a definite agreement reached. It was announced.

GIRL WANTS 8-HOUR LAW SET ASIDE

Washington, D. C., March 12.—Miss Ethel E. Nelson today appealed to the supreme court to set aside the California eight hour women's law as unconstitutional. Miss Nelson is a graduate pharmacist in the Samuel Merritt hospital in Alameda county, California, and contends that if the law is enforced, she will take her place.

CASHIER OF DEFUNCT BANK IS ACQUITTED

Canon City, Colo., March 12.—After it was shown that he was one of the heaviest losers among the bank's 400 creditors, Newton Taylor, a former cashier of the defunct Florence State bank, was acquitted by a jury of having accepted deposits from the bank, which was known to be insolvent. The jury spent 48 hours in deliberation. The trial consumed more than three weeks.

Washington, D. C., March 12.—The president today sent the following nominations to the senate: For associate justice, supreme court of Hawaii, Ralph P. Quinlan, Honolulu. For marshal of the district of the canal zone, William Howard May, Culebra.

UNITED STATES LEADS WORLD IN IMPORTATIONS OF SUGAR

Washington, D. C., March 12.—The United States leads the world in the importation of sugar, according to a report issued today by the department of agriculture. The grand total of imports in 1912 was 3,221,187 short tons, compared with 2,972,514 short tons in 1911. Of this amount, 59.8 percent came from Cuba.
