

FOUR COUNTIES UNITE IN GOOD ROADS CAMPAIGN

Sand Hills Between Ward and Ector Counties Are to Be Bridged.

Pecos, Tex., April 8.—One of the results of the good roads meeting at Odessa will be, it is believed, the bridging with a permanent roadway the sand hills of Ward and Ector counties. At the Odessa meeting the counties of Reeves, Ward, Ector and Midland were well represented. All of the counties are pledged to assist in a general good roads campaign and the meeting was followed by almost immediate activity to start the movement.

Hail Kills Many Chickens.
Much damage was done by a storm north of Pecos. Windows in houses were broken, shingles were knocked off roofs, nearly all chickens were killed in several communities and trees and gardens badly damaged. With 45 hens, some of them having broods of young chicks, one poultryman near Pecos during the past month has gathered 1272 eggs.

ALBUQUERQUE IS CHILLED BY DAMAGING COLD WAVE

Albuquerque, N. M., April 8.—Apple and peach crops are believed to have been completely destroyed by the cold wave accompanying a storm which swept central New Mexico Tuesday night. Thirty-one hundred acres of an orchard here in an hour, the heaviest rainfall of the year. The storm, accompanied by hail, sleet and snow, was general over the central, eastern and western parts of the state.
