

**BODY OF MEXICAN FOUND IN CANAL**

Corpses Identified As That of Pomposo Orozco of San Simon, Ariz. Bullet Hole in Head Suggests Murder. The body of Pomposo Orozco, aged 35 years, was found in the canal early Monday morning by Victor Barcia, a canal line rider. The man had been shot through the right temple. Death was instantaneous. Coroner E. B. McClintock, who held the inquest, believes that the man had been dead a week or 10 days, and was murdered. The man had come to El Paso from San Simon, Arizona.

**FORMER EMPLOYEE SUES S. P. FOR \$90,000 DAMAGES**

Alexander McDonald Seeks Redress For Alleged Defamation of Character.

In a suit filed in the 41st district court Monday, Alexander McDonald, formerly a railroad switchman, seeks to recover damages in the sum of \$90,000 from the Southern Pacific Railway company, for alleged defamation of character.

In his petition, McDonald alleges that on July 2, 1912, the defendant company caused to be published a letter and delivered it to the G. H. & S. A. Railway company, in which the letter stated, so McDonald alleges, that he was "discharged for quitting without notice." Because of this the plaintiff says he has been unable to obtain employment. Up to May 12, 1912, he says he was employed by the defendant company as a switchman at Bowie, Ariz.

McDonald says that he voluntarily left the employ of the Southern Pacific company, after notifying the foreman of his intention to quit. In the same court Mrs. Louise Rath filed suit Monday against the Western Union Telegraph company, asking damages in the sum of \$250 for alleged failure on the part of the company to deliver a message. The plaintiff alleges in her petition that she sent a message to E. A. Barnell at Hillsboro, Texas, on March 15, 1914, stating that Charles Roth, her husband, was very ill and to come at once. She declares the message was never delivered. Her husband died on March 22. Barnell was her brother-in-law.

Gifford was well played, although his dialect was so pronounced that he could not understand with difficulty. Jessica Ray played Hilda with a subdued emotional interpretation which was a relief from the usual raising of such characters. Bing O'Connor had a small part as Battiste Le Grande, the fur trader, but played it well. John Pringle, who was in El Paso with the Tri-State Amusement company, played the part of William McDonald and Clyde Watson, the good humored George Huntley, McDonald's assistant.
