San Antonio, Texas, April 23.—All available troops at Fort Sam Houston were ordered out for border patrol service late today. Battery B goes to El Paso and cavalry troops to Eagle Pass, Laredo and Brownsville. The battery consists of four three-inch field guns, and 133 men. Orders for the troop movements were issued by Gen. Tasker H. Bliss in response to appeals received from persons living in the border towns. As a result the garrison at the post here, consisting of 600 troops, is completely depleted.

AMMUNITION of 255,000 rounds of ammunition by government officials was made Thursday morning at 11 o'clock. The ammunition was in the warehouse of Gutierrez, Velasco and company, Second and Leon streets. Application had been made early in the morning for permission to ship the ammunition across the river to Villa's forces. As soon as the embargo was declared the government officials went to the warehouse and seized the quantities of war.
