

FARMER GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

Jury at Tucumcari Convicts Carey Van Sickle; Penalty Is Death.

Tucumcari, N. M., April 24.—After a trial in the district court here lasting two days a jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree against Carey Van Sickle, charged with the murder of Dudley Anderson, a constable, near San Juan, this county, in December, 1913.

Van Sickle was a farmer and when constable Anderson went to his home to arrest him for an alleged infraction of the law, the latter followed Anderson and in the fight which followed Anderson was shot and killed.

The plea of the defense at the trial was self-defense, it being alleged that Van Sickle had first drawn and attempted to use his gun without sufficient provocation.

The penalty for first degree murder in New Mexico is death by hanging. Judge Thomas D. Lick, who presided at the trial, has not yet passed sentence on the convicted prisoner, who is held in jail here.

LEWIS IS FINED \$200; APPEALS. On charge of an assault with a prohibited weapon, W. W. Lewis was assessed a \$200 fine by a jury of the 24th district court late Thursday afternoon. After the verdict was returned, Lewis made a motion for a new trial, which was overruled. He then gave notice of appeal. The case grew out of an assault that Lewis is alleged to have made on Charles Zeigler, at the New Zeigler hotel, several weeks ago. A pistol played a part in the assault.

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PHOENIX TRADES COUNCIL BITTER AGAINST I. W. W.

Resolutions Denounce Society and Demand Expulsion of Members.

Phoenix, Ariz., April 24.—Strong resolutions, denouncing the Industrial Workers of the World and demanding that all members of that society be expelled from labor unions, have been adopted by the Phoenix Trades Council, a organization of union men. "Conditions demand such action, which has really been too long deferred," the resolutions state. These continue: "During the last winter and spring, and the present time, certain groups in Phoenix composed of so-called Industrial Workers of the World, syndicalists, anarchists and just plain freaks, have been carrying on a sinister agitation which, purporting to be a campaign in behalf of the unemployed, is really a guerrilla warfare against organized labor. With every falsehood they could devise they have attempted to divide the labor movement and to furnish aid and support to unfair employers. Some of them have even taken jobs at unfair wages and a number of them have openly declared their intention of disrupting the unions."

L. W. W. Stirring Up Trouble. The whereabouts of Nelson O'Shaughnessy, the American charge, who last night informed the state department that he was leaving Mexico City with his parents, is now a matter of some speculation. He had announced his intention of going to Veracruz by rail, but private dispatches today reported him on his way to Manzanillo on the Pacific coast. The department was unable to get an information later than Mr. O'Shaughnessy's announced intention of leaving by way of Veracruz.

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WOMAN IS HELD. Maria Solis alias Ferminala Solis, was arrested Thursday by the immigration officers as she attempted to enter the United States. She had been deported from the United States some time ago as an undesirable citizen.
