

DEAN OF MINES SCHOOL ARRIVES TO TAKE CHARGE

Dr. S. H. Worrell Will Superintend the Remodeling of Institute Buildings.

Dr. S. H. Worrell, of the Texas university, dean of the School of Mines, has arrived from Austin and is arranging to have the old military institute buildings remodeled for the state school which will open on Wednesday, September 23.

Prof. William F. Allison, of the Colorado school of mines has already been selected as one of the members of the faculty of the school of mines. In addition to the regular faculty, there will be a lecturing faculty composed of prominent mining experts in the southwest who will deliver a course of lectures to the students of the school during the year.

The appropriation for the first year amounts to \$15,000 and the regents have given assurance that the school of mines will have all the financial support that will be needed to make it the best school of its kind in the southwest.

Dr. Worrell, the new dean of the school, is a graduate of the University of Texas of the class of 1901, in the chemistry department.

He was accompanied here from Austin by Mrs. Worrell and their daughter at the Hotel Paso del Norte for the present, but will later be at home at the school on the mesa.

RETIRES TO SELL BONDS FOR NEW PUBLIC BUILDING

Bids Will Be Opened Next Monday and Award Is Expected to Be Made Then.

Consistent with the growth and prosperity of El Paso, the city and county and municipal building is about to be added to the list of buildings which the city boasts. The plans for the construction of the building were voted some time ago. The building will be a lecture hall, a reading room, will be opened at the season of the county commissioners court next Monday. It is estimated that the building will be made at this time, resulting in a sale of the bonds. The proposition will then be turned over to the architect and following the acceptance of the architect's plans the actual construction of the building will be started. The site is practically settled on in the present site of the county courthouse.

TOWNSEND ATTACKS EXEMPTION REPEAL

Washington, D. C., May 4.—A vigorous attack on the bill to repeal the toll exemption clause of the Panama canal act was made in the senate today by Senator Townsend of Michigan. He declared the passage of the repeal bill would mean voting the "United States quality of perfect and dishonorable" to the original decision to exempt American ships. He characterized as "cowardly" the attitude of those who favored the repeal because foreign nations had challenged the right of the United States to exempt its coastwise shipping from toll.

FRENCH VANQUISH MOORS DECISIVELY

Fez, Morocco, May 4.—A desperate battle between the French troops and the followers of the native pretender to the Moroccan throne resulted Sunday in the defeat of the Moors, who suffered heavy losses. French casualties totaled nine killed and 25 wounded. The French troops attacked the natives in a mountain stronghold which they carried at the point of the bayonet in spite of a tenacious resistance by the Moors. The Moorish camp was destroyed.

IS ARRAIGNED ON CHARGE OF MURDER

After this postponement, Teodoro Kyriakopoulos, charged with assault with intent to murder Alfonso Fernandez, was arraigned for trial Monday morning in the 24th criminal court. Kyriakopoulos was held in the Spanish riot that occurred on South El Paso street December 14, 1912, when Fernandez is alleged to have been cut.

GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE REBEL MONEY

Judge Dan Jackson Instructs Jury to Look Into Counterfeit Business.

The new county grand jury for the May term of the fifth district court in an effort to ascertain if there is a violation of the law to circulate bogus "Constitutionalist" money in El Paso. That instruction among others was given by Judge Dan M. Jackson to the new grand jury when he empaneled it Monday morning. El Paso has been flooded with counterfeit rebel money and while the city detectives have been active in attempting to prevent its circulation to the extent that a number of arrests were made, nothing has yet been done with the cases. The detectives have recovered something like \$100,000 alleged counterfeit rebel money.

Charles Hydroff is the foreman of the new grand jury. The other members are S. C. Aweber, H. S. Beach, J. Steinaroff, T. M. Sator, Julius Krallinger, T. A. Haysler, J. J. Mundy, E. Mayo, J. E. Bowen, J. E. Spence and Manuel Rosales. After receiving the statutory instructions covering examining, permitting jurors to play in pool halls, punning of houses of prostitution and the like, the grand jury retired to the grand jury room.

The grand jury at its first session returned one indictment. Patty Johnson, neeess, was indicted on a charge of killing her husband John Henry Johnson.

Hundreds of Families Abandon Homes When Wall of Water Sweeps Down.

Bridgeport, Okla., May 4.—As the result of a flood, which carried away the \$125,000 steel bridge of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad Sunday, three men were reported missing and three others were reported in trees. The damage in the lowlands was heavy. Hundreds of families abandoned their homes when a wall of water 15 feet high came roaring down the Canadian river. Six men were on the bridge when it fell.
