

LIBERAL PARTY IN ENGLAND IS NOW IN 9TH YEAR

Its Power Has Been Uninterrupted During the Entire Period.

(Continued From Page One.)
 Liberal party in power for any considerable length of time, in any country, tends to become more and more conservative in deed and thought, increasingly devoted to the maintenance of the status quo.
 The Liberal party in England, now in its ninth year of uninterrupted power, apparently negatives this ordinary rule. In fact, it only proves it. This paradox lies in the fact that despite the boasted claims for responsibility, parliamentary government, and for the flexibility of the British constitution, the actual government is so slowly responsive to political change that the Liberals have not had enough of actual power to cause the reaction toward conservatism to set in.
 The House of Lords, being overwhelmingly conservative, has blocked all Liberal legislation. The effort to get around this has been met by the parliament act, but even that gives the Lords the power to delay for two years, while their fellow conservatives in the lower house cry out for general elections and appeals to the people on each individual measure.
 This practical demonstration of the inability of a Liberal government to make any headway without the consent of the party of the aristocracy has tended to convince Liberals of even the more moderate type that this country really is ruled by the aristocrats. That has caused them, and the whole party gradually to become more and more radical. This fact has operated to lessen the breach between them and the Labor party, so that it is just now well nigh invisible.

SEATTLE IS OPERATING MUNICIPAL CAR LINES
 Seattle, Wash., May 21.—Operation of the first division of Seattle's municipal street car system was begun today. The line extends from the business part of the city to Ballard, a manufacturing district four miles north. Twenty-five tickets are sold for \$1, but ordinary fare is five cents. The city is negotiating for purchase of the Seattle, Renton and Southern railroad, which connects with the line opened today.

CHIHUAHUITA IS FACING CLEAN UP BY THE MILITARY

Gen. Pershing Offers to Make Mexican Settlement Sanitary if Given Power.

Chihuahuita will be cleaned and polished by the army if mayor C. E. Kelly will give Gen. John J. Pershing, commanding the border patrol division, the necessary permission to put the boys to work on the south side.
 Gen. Pershing has written to the mayor, telling him of the condition of the Mexican settlement near the soldier quarters in Camp Cotton. The two infantry regiments camps in Camp Cotton are as clean and sanitary as a hospital operating room. But across the narrow street from the sixth infantry camp are a row of typical Mexican hovels where the refuse is thrown into the alley or street, the outbuildings are unsanitary and filled with their germ laden feet in the garbage barrels. To Gen. Pershing, good soldier that he is, a soldier is fighting unit and he cannot afford to allow a single one of his "dough boys" to contract any fever or other disease via the flying fly rods.
 Asking Authority to Act.
 Knowing the mayor to be a progressive in civic matters, Gen. Pershing has addressed a communication to Mayor Kelly asking him to take up the matter of sanitation on the south side near the soldier camps and see what can be done to better conditions. Gen. Pershing says he will be glad to put his soldiers to work cleaning up the Mexican settlements surrounding the camps and will see that the district is kept as sanitary as is the model camp across the guard line in Camp Cotton. The suggestion has been made before that the army on the border be used to police Chihuahuita and to put the Mexican part of the civic house in order. Gen. Pershing is now ready to put the plan into effect and with one sanction of the south side settlement clean and sanitary it is expected that conditions along the entire south side will be improved.
20th Infantry Coming Back.
 The 20th Infantry will be returned to El Paso from Fort Wingate as soon as the coal strike trouble is over in Colorado. The border division commanders have been advised that the 12th cavalry which was sent to Colorado from Fort Wingate will be returned to the prison camp as soon as conditions in Colorado will permit.

BUILDER OF ASSUAN DAM TO VISIT CITY
St. William Wilcox Coming to South-west to Inspect Great Elephant Butte Irrigation Project.
 St. William Wilcox, world authority on irrigation and designer and builder of the great Assuan dam in Egypt, will be here Monday as the guest of the reclamation service.
 St. William is making an inspection of the irrigation projects in the United States as the guest of the United States reclamation service. He will be accompanied to El Paso by William Butler, a member of the reclamation commission. While here, the famous English engineer will be taken to the Elephant Butte dam in an automobile and will be shown the construction work on the great American dam that is to rival the Assuan project. It has the irrigation for the British government in Egypt and has developed a system of irrigation in the United States that is the eighth wonder of the world.
 The Egyptian project was built to prevent famines in that country and was intended to bring the desert under the plow.
 St. William Wilcox has developed such an efficient system of irrigation and reclamation, has been so successful that the project is now turning dividends to the British government.
 The distinguished English nobleman will be here for several days and will be entertained by the reclamation service officials and the Water Users' association.
