U. S. A GAIN ASKS ABOUT BAUCH CASE

State Department Calls on Consul Letcher to Furnish Additional Information For Purpose of Completing Record; No Known Intention of Reopening Bauch and Benton Cases at Present, but Claims Will Be Preferred.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Instructions to American consul Marion Letcher at Chihuahua city to furnish the state department with additional information to complete the record so far as possible in the case of Gustav Bauch, the American railroad mechanic arrested by the "Constitutionalist" authorities at Juarez, Mex., on Feb. 18, last, and who later disappeared, furnished the foundation of a report that the department is about to reopen the Bauch case and the Benton case as well.

MEDIATION BOARD HALTS TO ATTEND A GARDEN PARTY

VILLA MOVES ENTIRE ARMY TO THE SOUTH

OFFICIALS A WAIT IMPENDING MOVE

No One Knows Just When the Dictator Will Abdicate; Rumor that He Has Already Left Mexico City and Is on His Way to Puerto Mexico Is Not Confirmed; Spanish Ambassador Wants U. S. to Intervene For Brothers at Monterey.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Official dispatches sent from Mexico City and received at a diplomatic source here today say the "withdrawal" of Huerta is "possible," and that it is being delayed by the necessity of arrangements to permit the dictator to abdicate with dignity.

NEGOTIATIONS ARE RESUMED BY REBELS

Representation of "Constitutionalists" at Niagara Falls May Be Limited to Matter of Obtaining Information, but Progress on Settlement of Land Problem Leads to Belief Carranza May Want to Take Part.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Representatives of the "Constitutionalists" here took steps today to reopen the question of representation at the Niagara mediation conference.

John Lind and C. A. Douglas, legal representative of the "Constitutionalists," held what was termed a neutral conference early today and later went to the state department to take up the subject with secretary of state Bryan, who had gone to the capital to confer with senators of the foreign relations committee.

Although the "Constitutionalists" have reiterated that they are willing to participate in any mediation which deals with the relations of Mexico with the United States, and that they were opposed to taking part in any mediation over the internal affairs of Mexico, it was pointed out that the recurring proposal for the establishment of a provisional government to be selected by the mediators, the Huerta delegates and the American delegates, and to be recognized by the United States, may have advanced the situation to the point where the "Constitutionalists" think it best for their interests to have representatives on the ground.


OBREGON DENIES HE EXECUTED FEDERALS

DIFFERENT PLANS Laid

PASSING OF HOME RULE BILL IS NOT FOLLOWED BY RIOTS

LONDON, Eng., May 27.—The passing of the home rule bill has not led to the breaking of its single head in Ireland. The predictions made by certain Unionists that its final adoption by the house of commons would be followed by riots and sanguinary conflicts between the Orangemen and the Nationalists, have proved to be untrue thus far.

HEAVY RAIN AT ROSWELL

ROSWELL, N. M., May 27.—The heaviest rain for several years fell here today, an inch and a half falling in 30 minutes, accompanied by a heavy hail, damaging some apple orchards. The damage was not heavy as the large orchards were not in the path of the storm.

WILLIAM CAPLES CASE IS REVERSED

AUSTIN, Tex., May 27.—The court of criminal appeals today reversed and remanded the case of William Caples, 21, Pan county. The court reversed judgment on the part of the state in not permitting the depositions of the father and mother of the prosecuting witness, Ellen Godsey, to be introduced, which showed she was 18 years of age.

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
