AUDIENCE CHEERS STARS AND STRIPES AT EL PASO THEATER

Dramatic Scene Attends Presentation of Historical Pageant Thursday Night.

Springing to their feet with the first notes of the Star Spangled Banner, the entire audience of almost 1500 people cheered the entrance of "Old Glory" in the final of the three civil war scenes of the historical pageant. The south-west at the commencement exercises of the high school at the Thursday night performance at the El Paso theater.

In this scene after the Union men sang "Yankee Doodle" and Confederates "Dixie," Dorothy Congdon, as "Lola," the spirit of good and blessing, came between the two factions and started singing "The Star Spangled Banner."

At the chorus "Old Glory" was brought in by Fred Cheaney, whose great grandfather was a color bearer in the Union army through the civil war. The Confederate flag was dipped in salute to "Old Glory" and both the Union and Confederate armies joined in singing "The Star Spangled Banner."

As the 15th cavalry orchestra started to play this inspiring air, the federal soldiers on the stage sprang to their feet and stood at attention, and the army officers in the audience likewise immediately stood up and cheered. As a patriotic demonstration it was one of the greatest that El Paso has ever witnessed.

The pageant presentation was received by a most enthusiastic audience, which packed the theater to its capacity. Many hundreds of people were turned away.

The final presentation of the pageant will be given Friday night, closing with the presentation of diplomas to the graduating class.

Much of the work behind the scenes in staging the scenes of the pageant was done by the students. Robert Marton and Fred Hunter operating the lights, Chris Fox the curtains and Albert Tatum helping with the scenery and properties. Assisting the students in the dressing rooms were three of the faculty, S. S. Ulrey and Allen Sayles for the boys, and Miss Eula Harper for the girls.
