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Ritchie-Welsh Fight July 7 Stirs Wide Interest Abroad

Like Gunboat Smith, Ritchie Has Captivated the British; He Has Set Up Training Quarters and Is Reducing Weight; Welsh and Ritchie Have Only Nice Things to Say of Each Other.

LONDON, ENGL., July 1.—Olympic is to be the scene of the three great boxing contests in England soon. It is the biggest hall in London, and quite adequate for the great international bouts which have just concluded, and in the center of the arena is the square "ring" in which the world's lightweight and European heavyweight championships will be decided.

Wales is an island and Welsh elash July 7, and Gunboat Smith exclaims George Carpenter July 11. Ritchie has captivated the Britons, just as Gunboat Smith did before the little man arrived and of course, they simply dole on Welsh and on Carpenter in a lesser degree, perhaps after all, C. H. Cochran will get his money back, and something in addition for promoting these two contests, both of which will be refereed by "Gus" Corbi, one of the strictest and best. When Ritchie called for Corbi to act he knew he was on a sure ground and was not a bit afraid of the game on this side of the water.

Ritchie Gets What He Wants. We are told that Welsh has got the wrong end of the bargain in agreeing to 125 pounds, at 2 o'clock on the day of the contest. This is the English lightweight standard and two pounds over the international weight, but Ritchie wanted it and he got it. In fact, Ritchie, as he is a champion, has got nearly all he wanted. So has Welsh, for he tells me that the gratification of his ambition was greater than any monetary consideration, which may be so, seeing that he has collected \$24,000 during his last American tour and has a fine bouncing little daughter waiting in California. I am not surprised that he was in an amiable mood when terms were arranged.
